

Bishop Kearney To Dedicate Church, Rectory Of St. Vincent's, Corning

Corning — The new \$385,000 St. Vincent de Paul's Church and rectory will be blessed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney during the regular 11 a.m. Mass Sunday (June 26), according to plans announced this week.

Bishop Kearney, in addition to blessing the church, will be celebrant for Mass and will preach the special sermon. Some 50 priests of the Rochester diocese will be on hand for the blessing service, and several will participate in the Mass. Host pastor for the Mass will be the Rev. Joseph V. Guilfoil, who came to the parish June 4, 1940. During the past several years, Father Guilfoil, has directed fund raising projects to carry out the big building program to care for the rapidly expanding church and parochial school needs for Northside Catholics.

The 62 oaken benches provide seating facilities for 600 persons for Mass, and the ornate lighting fixtures in the ceiling add to the desirability of the church-goers of the Northside.

The opening of the four new classrooms in September will provide facilities for the 350 children expected to attend the parish parochial school this fall and will make possible the closing of the temporary classrooms in the church basement and in the cabin.

AS SOON as the new church is open for Mass, workmen will begin within a few days converting the old church into four new classrooms and offices for the principal and school nurse. The principal and school nurse will be situated over the old church now serves as the school with six rooms now in use, in addition to temporary classrooms in the church basement and in a cabin on the church property.

At the time of the fund campaign, the following short history of St. Vincent de Paul's Church was presented:

"On Sunday, July 20, 1913, Bishop Thomas F. Hickey announced his decision to establish a new parish on Corning's growing North Side, which would also serve the Catholics in the Painted

Bishop Kearney Honors 12 Area Lay Catechists

Ithaca — Twelve graduates received Confraternity of Christian Doctrine diplomas from His Excellency Bishop Kearney at an impressive ceremony following the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass at Church of the Immaculate Conception, Ithaca on Sunday, June 19.

Bishop Kearney was introduced by the Rev. Robert Downs as the Official Teacher of Christian Doctrine in the Diocese and successor of the Apostles delivered the commencement sermon.

The need of trained teachers in religion was explained by the Bishop with examples. He said "such teachers must have confidence in themselves and its a great mistake to permit people to teach Christian Doctrine unless they have technical training.

"If training to be teachers of history or English or science is necessary then technical training to be a teacher of Religion is even more necessary since Christian Doctrine is the greatest of all sciences."

TEN OF THE Catechists were members of the Immaculate Conception Parish, Ithaca, and two Catechists represented the Van Etten parish of St. Paul's.

The Catechists took an extensive 60 hour course in Christian Doctrine from the priest assistants, Reverend Fathers Paul Morgan, Otto Vogt and Robert Downs and in Methods of Teaching Religion from a Mission Helper of the Sacred Heart. At the conclusion of the courses those who qualified took final written examinations in both subjects.

With the opening of the scholastic year in September these new technically trained teachers of religion will staff some of the 73 weekly release time classes in which over 800 children are enrolled in the city and rural areas under the supervision of the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart.

The Catechists will follow the graded series of religion outlines, "Confraternity School Year Religion Course" written by a committee of Sisters in the Catechetical field and published by the National Office of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Washington, D.C.

Father Vogt was celebrant of the Mass at which His Excellency presided. Rt. Rev. Msgr. William Byrnes, V.F., Pastor Very Rev. Msgr. Donald M. Cleary, Rev. Albert H. Schnack, Diocesan Director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, Father Morgan and Father Downs were also present in the Sanctuary. The Sisters of St. Joseph and the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart attended.

In the 87 year-old history of the Rochester diocese this is the second time that such a graduation was held. On May 24, 1953, Bishop Kearney presented diplomas to twelve Ithaca Lay Catechists following Solemn High Mass. Hymns were sung during the Mass by the St. Cecilia Choir under the direction of Sister M. Margaret Josephine, S.S.J. with Miss Adriana Rubens at the organ.

Responding to the call of Pope Pius XII for the laity to spread catechetical instruction, the zealous lay apostles trained in Ithaca, learn the "Confraternity Religion Course" by using it. Each class was brought to a close by the Sister Instructor asking, "Keep the Faith?" and the lay catechists answering, "No, spread it."

Text Of Bishop Kearney's Address At Ithaca Rite

Ithaca — Text of Bishop Kearney's address at exercises for lay catechists, Sunday, June 19 at Church of the Immaculate Conception, here, follows:

"My dear Friends: It is a distinct pleasure and a great consolation at the same time to take part in a ceremony of this kind because the program of instructing young people in our religion is becoming a very serious one in the Catholic Church at the present time and the obligation or the privilege by which the laity may share in this work of our Divine Lord is a very important vocation and one which brings with it divine assistance and divine recompense.

"When our Divine Lord in His final moments stood before Pontius Pilate and was asked, 'Are you a king?', our Divine Lord answered in terms of His teaching, 'For this I was born and for this I came into the world that I might give testimony to the truth.' He was very deeply concerned that the things He taught should be carried into the hearts of the people all through the ages.

"I REMEMBER very vividly when I was a young student in the New York Normal School for Teachers — the textbooks we had then has as its opening chapter, 'The Great Teacher,' and it told of Jesus Christ as a teacher. His whole program of teaching was going from the known to the unknown — from the simple to the complex — from the abstract to the concrete. He would pick a leaf from a tree and talk about that. 'When He talked about the necessity of Holy Communion, after He instituted that sacrament, He didn't say, 'You must receive Holy Communion.' He said, 'I am the Vine and you are the branches. If a branch falls off the Vine it withers and dies. . . . Without Me, you can do nothing.' Christ used many such

"He mentioned that last year he baptized 1200 children which means that six years from now he would have to have a parochial school that would take at least 100 children in 1A class, obviously an impossibility.

"THAT PRIEST has to have a vision now of what he is going to do with those 1,000 children who will come to him for religious instruction. He has set up in his parish a school for parents. He has engaged faculty members of St. John's and Fordham Universities to give technical religious training to every young mother and father in his parish.

"They have to be in a general sense the teachers of their children — they have to be technically trained to do in their (Continued on Page 8)
