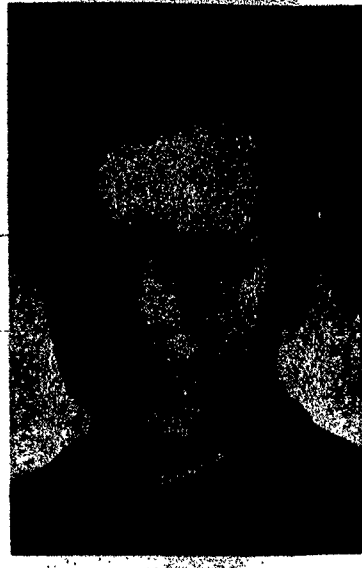

Father Tierney a graduate of Blessed Sacrament School and Aquinas Institute Rochester and the Holy Cross Seminary at the University of Notre Dame and the Foreign Missionary Seminary of Holy Cross, Washington celebrated his First Solemn Mass at Blessed Sacrament Church in 1950. 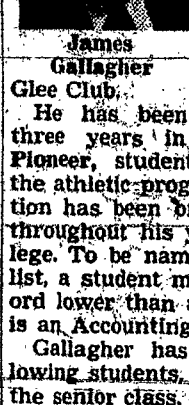

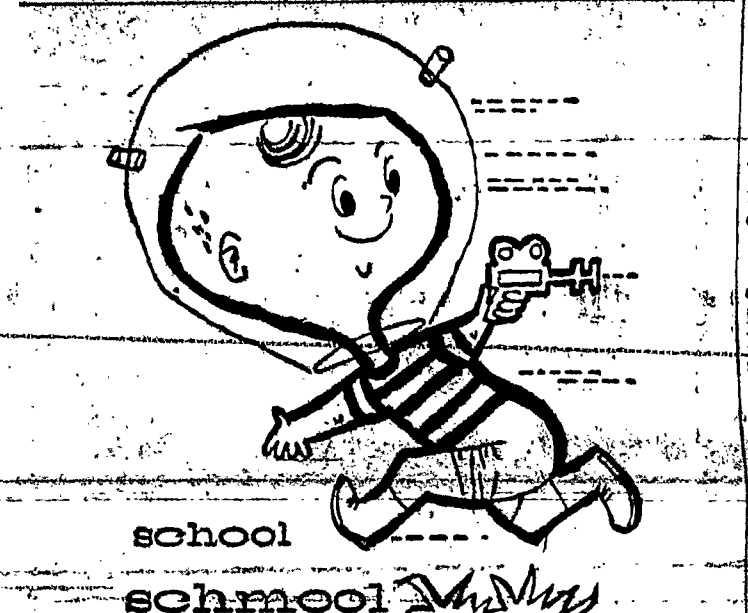
