

Parochial School Bus Rides Reviewed

New Orleans—(RNS)—An Orleans Parish School Board order cancelling bus service to four outlying Catholic parochial schools was revoked here by Dr. James F. Redmond, superintendent of public schools.

He said that bus schedules will be rearranged to care for all the 382 pupils involved without buying additional buses. When the cancellation order was issued the school board said the move was made for economy reasons.

Although the new schedule will require some students to leave home earlier and return later in the afternoon, Dr. Redmond said, this cannot be avoided.

Mrs. Henry C. Bezu, vice-president of the school board, commended Dr. Redmond and other public officials for their interest and cooperation in arranging continued bus service for Catholic students.

New Orleans is one of the few cities in the country where more children attend private than public schools.

Peron Doomed Revolution Reported Brewing In Argentina

The following account of the seething unrest in Argentina was written by a veteran newspaperman who has just returned from a visit to that troubled country.

From all indications, a Democlean sword hangs over the Peron regime, which for nearly ten years has held Argentina in an ever-tightening totalitarian vise.

Every one I talked to in Buenos Aires—diplomats, priests, students, Catholic Action leaders, workers, taxi-drivers, housewives, etc.—seemed to agree that Peron's downfall is only a matter of time.

The over-all impression I gained is that Argentina is on the verge of a new revolution that might well lead to civil war. Among every section of the population I heard the same question being repeated over and over: "Y ahora que?" What next?

LARGE SEGMENTS of the army—and of the workers—are still strongly peronist, thanks to the benefits they have enjoyed at the hands of El Lider. But there are other elements in the ranks of both the Army and the "descamisados" who are seething with discontent and want to see an end to the corruption, repression and intimidation that have hall-marked the Peron regime.

Even more to be reckoned with are the great masses of the population, almost entirely Catholic, to whom peronismo has become synonymous with religious persecution.

Illicitly indifferent Catholics who raised no outcry when the Peron government initiated its anti-Church campaign last November, have been shocked out of their lethargy by the looting and profaning of churches by peronist mobs in the wake of the June 16 revolt.

It is an undisputed fact that these outrages, not to mention the new laws and decrees aimed against the Church and religion, have been a major factor in the credit of the Peron regime in the eyes of Catholics who had previously supported it. Far from weakening the prestige and influence of the Church, these excesses proved a political boomerang by intensifying rather than diminishing the loyalty of lukewarm Catholics toward the Church. The choice had to be made: Peron or the Church.

THE CATHOLIC population has been stirred to new indignation by the recent declaration of Minister of Interior and Justice Oscar Alburquerque that the government was planning to review the anti-Church offensive dramatically halted by the June revolt. Already the Church is experiencing anew the calumnies and slanders that were a particularly vicious feature of the anti-Church campaign.

Peron offered his political opponents the hand of friendship and reconciliation, but he made no move of any real significance to patch up his quarrel with the Church. The Church is suffering active persecution again, as evidenced by new arrests of priests on fabricated charges of being involved in an "assassination plot."

Covington Diocese Sets Convert Bid

Covington, Ky.—(NC)—Bishop William T. Mulloy has set September 4 as the opening date of the second Crusade for Souls in the Diocese of Covington.

Six weeks of prayer will precede the visitation of homes in the diocese. An appropriate prayer composed for the Crusade will be recited after every Mass and Benediction service in the diocese.

Each parish will conduct public information talks. Persons who manifested some interest in the Church when approached last year will be visited again and invited to the talks. Personal calls will be made on the non-Catholic spouses of mixed marriages.

Last year 2,779 parishioners made some 75,000 home calls and reported 4,636 persons interested in the Church. During the visits, 2,459 lapsed Catholics were contacted and many returned to the Sacraments.

Permission Denied For Diving Act

Chicago—(NC)—The Chancery Office of the Chicago Archdiocese has refused its permission to a French priest who planned to make a 115 foot dive into Lake Michigan to raise money for his parish.

The visiting priest, Father Robert Simon, 42, has given 35 high-diving exhibitions in France, Belgium, Switzerland and Morocco since 1947 in order to rebuild his war-torn church and erect other buildings for his parish in Saone.

Father Simon, who came to the United States especially to raise funds, was quoted as saying that he had never been refused permission to put on his high-diving act before, but that "never have I asked permission before."

Los Angeles—(NC)—His Eminence James Francis Cardinal McIntyre, Archbishop of Los Angeles, will offer the annual Labor Day Mass on September 5, sponsored here by the Catholic Labor Institute.

Fatima Children's Kin In Seminary

Chicago—(NC)—A cousin of the three children "to whom" the Blessed Virgin appeared at Fatima in 1917 is now a student at the priesthood at the Divine Word Seminary in Fatima, Portugal, a school built by funds donated by Americans through the S.V.D. Catholic Universities, which has headquarters here.

The seminarian is Francisco dos Santos Marto. He is the son of Joao dos Santos Marto, a stone mason, who is a brother of the father of Francisco and Jacinto Marto, two of the three children of Fatima. The third child of Fatima, Lucia dos Santos, a cousin of the two other children, is now a cloistered nun.

The seminary at Fatima was opened last autumn and is situated just five minutes walking distance from the world-famous Fatima shrine.

Pope Receives Bicycle Riders

Castel Gandolfo, Italy—(RNS)—Pope Plus XII granted a special audience to the directors of the International Cyclists' Union and participants in the 1955 world professional bicycle road race championship which was held at Frascati near Rome.

Prelate Cites Laity's Role In Apostolate

Notre Dame, Ind.—(NC)—The important place of Catholic laymen in the apostolate of the Church must not be minimized. His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch declared here.

The Cardinal Archbishop of Chicago asserted that Catholic men and women shall never save their own souls "unless we do our full duty to help others save theirs."

Cardinal Stritch addressed a joint meeting of the Christian Family Movement and the Young Christian Workers at the Grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes on the University of Notre Dame campus.

The Cardinal described the apostolate of the Church as "the conservation and betterment as well as the spread of the Kingdom of Christ on earth."

The Cardinal called on all Catholic men and women to do their part in the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

Dutch Bishop Counsels Emigrants

The Hague, Netherlands—(NC)—The day Dutch Catholic emigrants leave their native country they receive a letter of advice and encouragement from Auxiliary Bishop John M. J. A. Hanssen of Rotterdam on behalf of the Dutch hierarchy.

Bishop Hanssen reminds emigrants leaving their country for Australia, Africa, Canada and the United States that at this decisive time in their lives the Holy Faith, their "most precious possession," will be their "strongest support."

He warns them that in the struggle for a new life "money and material goods may easily become idols." He tells them how easy it is for the emigrant to drift into religious apathy and neglect of religious practices.

Italy Honors Troops Lost In Russia

Carnaccio, Italy—(NC)—On Sunday morning, September 11, the citizens of this village will gather to dedicate an impressive monument to the memory of 7,000 Italian officers who never returned from the Russian front after World War II.

Toledo Diocesan Schools Mark Rise

Toledo, O.—(NC)—For the first time in the Diocese of Toledo, more than 40,000 boys and girls will be enrolled in the elementary and secondary schools of the diocese next month.

At least 80 new classrooms will be put into service this term to accommodate the enrollment increase of about 2,000 children. The new facilities will include 12 new buildings and wings or additions.
