Special Buses Serve McQuaid, St. Agnes Schools

Special bus service to both the new McQuaid-Jesuit High School, Clinton Ave. South and Elmwood Ave. and St. Agnes High School, East River Road is being provided by Rochester Transit Corp. according to Herbert J. Scheuer, vice president in charge of transportation.

With the approval of the state Public Service Commission, the RTC is now permitted to extend existing lines to McQuaid Jesuit High.

Two present bus routes have been extended. Some Clinton Ave. buses will continue beyond the Field Street terminal, going to the school and back. Some Meadowbrook buses also will be routed along Elmwood Ave. between Clinton and Eastland Avenues.

The service to St. Agnes High School started last year when the new building was put in use. Extra buses leave Main St. East for Plymouth Avenue South to Elmwood Avenue and through Genesee Valley Park to St. Agnes. Some buses to supplement this service will start from Plymouth Ave. South at Elmwood near the skating rink.

Aquinas Mothers To Hold Meeting

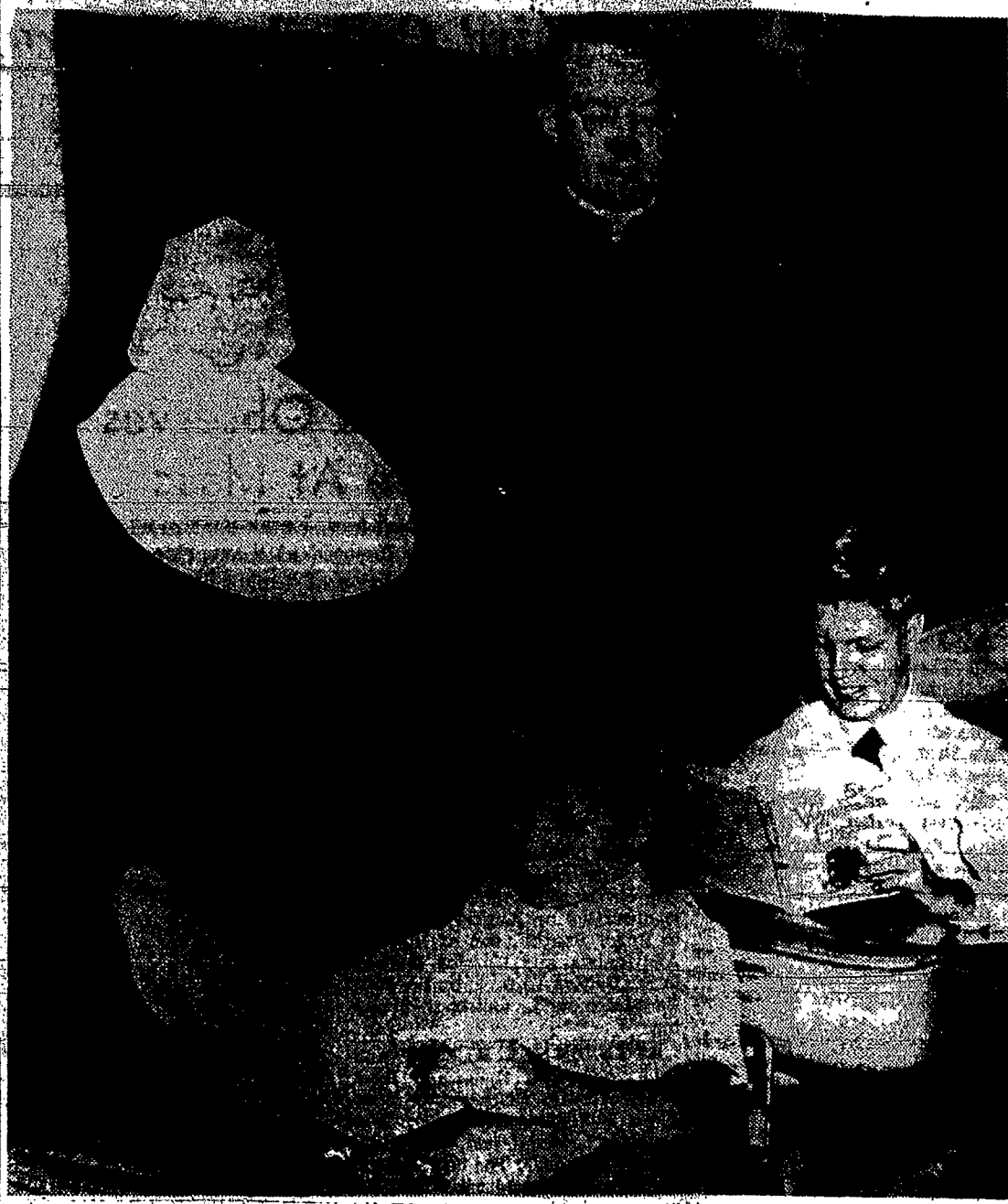

8 Classroom Addition To Be Dedicated Sunday In Greece

A new eight classroom addition for St. John's parochial school, Greece, will be solemnly blessed Sunday, September 11. His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey will preside at the 3 p.m. rite, according to the Rev. Donald E. Lux, pastor.

The addition to be blessed Sunday is the third unit built by the parish within six years to provide for the rapidly increasing enrollments at the West Ridge Road school. Units built in 1949, 1951, and 1953 provide a total of 19 classrooms, hall, offices, kitchen, and meeting room for the Greece parish.

ENROLLMENT AT St. John's has doubled in four years. From 425 in 1951 to 890 in 1955 and over 1,000 pupils are expected for the 1957 school year.

ST. JOHN'S is located in Greece Central public school district which is believed to have the largest pupil enrollment of any district in New York state.

Despite construction of the three new units at St. John's, school registration has already reached capacity for this year and pupils moving into the parish cannot be accepted at this time.

ELEVEN SISTERS of St. Joseph and four lay teachers staff the facility.

Suburban development in the Greece township has recently attracted considerable local attention. Population, it is reported, has jumped from 15,000 in 1935 to 37,000 in 1955, and a total of 90,000 is expected by 1975, making the town a good deal larger than many cities.

Catholics in Greece attend one of three parishes there.

West Webster School Opens With 406

St. Rita School, West Webster, newly built, will open Monday with an enrollment of 406 pupils following 9 a.m. Mass in the Church, according to the Rev. Francis A. Kiehammer, pastor.

The new school which will have grades one to eight will be in charge of four Sisters of Mercy and six lay teachers.

Dedication is scheduled for Sunday, Oct. 30 with His Excellency, Bishop Kearney officiating, Father Kiehammer said.

Simultaneous Masses in church and hall will be scheduled, Father Lux said, as attendance increases. He stated that parish priests enroll an average of five new families a week who move into newly built homes nearby.

The eight room school addition also contains a hall and two offices.

Men of the parish did the interior painting and aided in arranging the new classrooms for the school's opening on Wednesday, September 7.

Aquinas Grads To Sail For European Army Duty

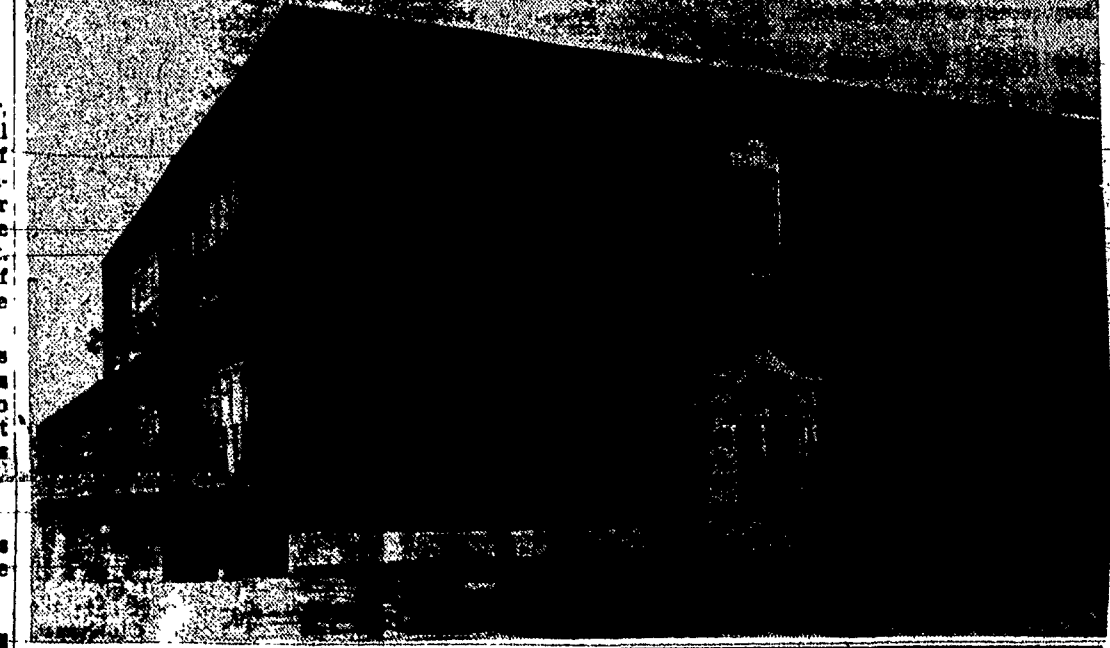

Pre-Cana Conferences Discussed In Geneva

Geneva — What is being done by the Catholic Church by means of the Pre-Cana Conferences to prepare young people for marriage, was told Ontario-Seneca-Yates unit of the National Council of Catholic Women Saturday.

Final luncheon in the series of five sponsored by the unit, was held in Town Pump, Orleans. Eighty-five women from Geneva, Penn Yan, Canandaigua, Newark and Sedus attended.

Guest speaker was the Rev. Richard C. Nangle, new principal of De Sales High School. He was introduced by the president, Miss Regina Sweeney.

FATHER NANGLE chose for his theme the work that is being done by the Catholic Church in preparing young people for marriage by means of the Pre-Cana Conference.

He emphasized the need of instruction if young people are to achieve harmony in marriage. Among the points, discussed, he said, were: 1. adaptation; 2. masculine and feminine psychology; 3. true conjugal love; 4. economic aspect of marriage life; 5. sublimity of matrimony as a sacrament; 6. the physiological aspect of marriage; 7. the moral obligations imposed upon the married couple; and lastly the importance of praying together, thinking together, and working together to secure happiness.
