GOD LOVE YOU!

HOW few understand the meaning of the Life of Christ! Many think of Him as a man, clean as a God-like man whose noble teachings were frustrated and ended in failure through the Crucifixion. Our Lord is none of these things. Neither is He a martyr passively submitting to superior powers that crucify. The Cross was not the end of His work; it was the focal-point of it; it was not the finish of His life, but the climax to which all else was subordinated. Did He not in the very beginning of His Public Life say: "Destroy the Temple, and in three days, I will rebuild it." The Temple is where God dwells. But God dwells in His Body. Therefore, "destroy my human life by crucifixion and in three days I will rise again."

We honor our missionaries who rot in Chinese dungeons; our Bishops and Cardinals who are hauled before the secular courts, but all these are but reflections of the Sacred Heart Who willed the sacrifice and death, though He could have escaped both. He was man and therefore He could die, but being God His death could not make up for our sins. Because of love, He came to earth; because of love He tabernacled among us; because of love He refused to come down from the Cross, for if He came down, He never would have saved us.

Look not to that sacrifice with "idle wonder. Bend to the Cross no eye of idle curiosity. His way is not the world's way which is selfishness. Our human nature like His must be stamped with sacrifice. We must look for sacrifice; we must seek out crosses several times a day, deny ourselves little things of pleasure to be more intimately united with the Cross. At your request we will send you a little paper book in which you can drop in penance and prayer and other petitions each day. At the end of the month, rather than to send them to the Holy Father through His Society for the Propagation of the Faith. These little crosses will be used to put crosses over altars in Africa, crosses over hospitals in India, crosses over schools in Burma, crosses over hospitals in Vietnam. Remember it was because Our Lord would not save Himself that He saved you.

Father Russell Heads English Carmelite Shrine

An American priest, Father W. Patrick Russell, Provincial of the New York Carmelite Province for the past six years was appointed Prior of Aylesford, England's great restored Pre-Reformation Shrine according to N.C.W.C. News Service dispatch from London.

Father Russell had a leading role in the establishment of Whitefriars Monastery in the former Case Mansion in Auburn in 1946 and later heard profession of vows of novices at the Monastery. The Shrine is in Kent, not far from London and also St. John Fisher Church, Rochester, England.

Father Russell succeeds Father Malachy Lynch, O.Carm., whose canonical period of office has expired. Father Lynch was prior at Aylesford since the Carmelites regained their ancient property and has been the driving force behind its re-establishment as a world pilgrimage center. He is staying on at Aylesford as director of its shrine of Our Lady and St. Ignace Stock, the order's first priory general.

Father Russell, born at Clonmel, County Tipperary, is expected to arrive in a few days. Our Lady appeared to St. Simon Stock at Aylesford in a vision 700 years ago. This started the Carmelite devotion of the Brown Scapular. Destroyed by King Henry the Eighth, the shrine was re-dedicated on the old ruins in 1951 when the Bishop of Bordeaux, France, proclaimed it with an important relic of the saint.


