# **Dioceses** Give Funds For Flood Relief

Hartford, Conn. - (NC) Nearly \$200,000 has been realized from special collections taken up in the churches of Connecticut's three dioceses for the benefit of, flood victums.

The special one-day collections were ordered by Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien of Harlford, Bishop Lawrence J. Shehan of Bridgeport and Bishop Bernard J. Flanagan of Norwich follow ing the recent disastrous floods which devastated large areas in Connecticut.

In the Archdiocese of Hartford, where most of the flood damage was concentrated, the collection totalled \$120.101,96; in the Diocese of Bridgeport \$52,312.56 was contributed; and in the Diocese of Norwich contributions came to \$20,000. The total in the three Sees was \$192,411.46 The money was turned over

to the disaster relief fund of the American Red Cross, by the three prelates.






