Arthur Farren, Catholic Editor Returns To City

Arthur P. Farren, editor for the last three years of the Catholic Star Herald, official organ of the Camden (N. J.) diocese, will return to his native city of Rochester this month to become associated with the Foley Associates, formerly the National Catholic Fundraising Organization.



Farren, formerly a reporter for the Catholic Courier Journal of the Rochester Diocese, left Rochester three years ago to become first editor of the newly-established Camden diocesan newspaper, first Catholic paper in New Jersey.

A graduate of Aquinas Institute, Farren had been active in several Catholic organizations of the Rochester Diocese before leaving the area, and was chairman of St. Joseph's House of Hospitality, South Ave. for nearly a decade.

He expects to resettle in Rochester in a few weeks with his family, which includes his mother, Mrs. Jennie Farren; his wife, Mary Bigham Farren, formerly of Canandaigua, a graduate of Nazareth College, and their four children, Patrick, Mary Anne, Margaret and Christine.

Sibley's To Build Suburban Store, Undergo Main Store Improvements

Sibley, Lindsay and Curr Co. has announced plans for a suburban store in the Eastway Shopping Plaza at the junction of Route 104 and Bay Rd. in the town of Penfield.

Opening date of the \$1,500,000 store has been set for Aug. 1, 1956.

The branch store will be a completely modern one-story white brick building (frimmed with redwood). The store will comprise 50,000 square feet of space with ample parking space in the plaza for 1,400 cars.

Some of the features of the new store will be wide aisles, air conditioning, a snack bar, modern lighting, terrazzo and carpeted floors, a complete beauty parlor and an outdoor garden shop.

ALONG WITH the expansion into the suburban area, Sibley's are instigating a \$5,000,000 improvement program for the main store. This program has already begun and officials hope to have a considerable portion of the street floor ready with new, modern departments in time for Christmas shopping.
