At least 3,500 delegates are expected to be present for the three days of sessions which will draw representatives from the seven dioceses of New York State as well as from dioceses throughout the East.

THE CONFRATERNITY is a Catholic organization for teaching religion established by Church law in every Catholic parish in the world. The Congress at Lake Placid is a regional Congress and is being held in Northern New York for the first time this year.

Inquiry, Convert Classes Open At St. Peter, Paul's

In keeping with its tradition of teaching catechism, St. Peter and Paul Parish, Elmira, will open a new class this Sunday afternoon, Sept. 18 at 2 p.m. in the Cenacle of the Parish School.

The book to be followed in the classes will be the modern and up-to-date "Catechism for Adults" which is the result of the combined efforts of many priests engaged for many years in convert work in the Archdiocese of Chicago. The book aims at three things:

1. Clearness: The book is a handbook, not a theological manual.
2. Simple terms: The questions and answers have been written in the language spoken by 20th Century Americans.
3. Correct emphasis: The book is designed to prepare its users for conversion, and not to make theologians of them.

The one weekly instruction will be given each Sunday between 2 and 3 p.m. It will be supplemented by the audio-visual educational equipment, and every possible modern technique now used in teaching catechism.
