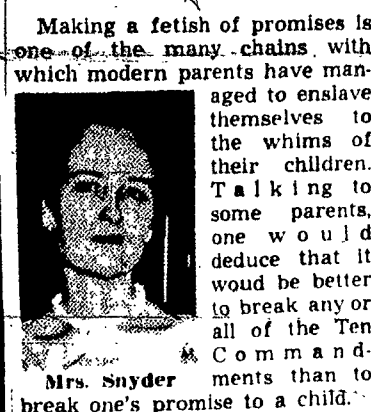


AMONG WOMEN
