

Child Guidance Group To Hear Children's Judge

Immaculate Conception School Child Guidance Group of Rochester has scheduled Children's Court Judge Joseph G. Frisch for its Oct. 24 meeting. The group, composed of parents of the parish, faculty of the school, priests of the Immaculate, and interested adults will meet at 8:00 p.m. in the school auditorium.

One of the main objectives of this unique group, a spokesman said, is to unite the home, school, and church more intimately. It is commonly felt that only by mutual understanding and cooperation existing among all three can children be both spiritually and mentally educated.

AN ATTRACTIVE program has been scheduled for this school year. Social, religious, and instructional meetings have been arranged by a special planning committee. The first meeting held shortly after school began this September, was a get acquainted evening where the parents had the opportunity of

meeting the sisters and discussing the duties of the school and the home in the education of the children.

Upwards of 300 persons attended that first meeting. If this is any indication of the enthusiasm which is to follow in successive meetings, a highly successful year is forecast.

Included in this year's plans are such prominent speakers as Sister Saint Mark, principal of Holy Childhood School in Rochester, and The Very Rev. Msgr. Joseph E. Vogt, Chaplain at the State Agriculture and Industrial School at Industry, N. Y. A gala Christmas party is planned for December.

Open House in the School in February, a communion-Sunday for March, roller skating party for April, and a basket picnic for June. These, and various other interesting activities, are intended to make the 1955-56 season the most energetic and productive year the Child Guidance has yet experienced.

Rochester Priest Named NCWC Information Director

The Rev. John E. Kelly, native of Rochester, was appointed director of the Bureau of Information of the National Catholic Welfare Conference by Archbishop Karl J. Alter, chairman of the NCWC Administrative Board. It was announced in Washington, this week.

Father Kelly attended St. Monica and Corpus Christi Schools in Rochester and was graduated from Aquinas Institute in 1930.

He was graduated from St. Bonaventure University in 1936 and began his studies for the priesthood at Our Lady of Angels Seminary, Niagara Falls, N.Y. The same year he received his master's degree from Niagara University in 1933 and was ordained in 1940.

FOR THE NEXT six years, Father Kelly engaged in parish work. In 1946 he was appointed the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine director in the Diocese of Trenton, and continued in that post until he was named an assistant in the publication department of the CCD National Center in Washington.

In the field of public relations, Father Kelly played a major role in publicizing the CCD revision of the No. 3 Baltimore Catechism which was issued in 1949; the establishment in 1951 of Bible Week to replace the previous one-day Biblical Sunday annual observance, and the observance in 1952 of a special Bible Week to commemorate the 500th anniversary of the Gutenberg Bible. Safety Precautions Issued By Mercy High Principal

Under the heading "Getting a Ride To School," Mother M. Francesca, principal of Our Lady of Mercy High School writing in Principal's Periscope, a publication for parents has the following to say on that subject:

The combination of auto and teenagers is a worry to every school. Only a small number of Mercy girls drive to school every day but a large proportion of our students come to school in someone else's car or takes ride home, ward after school. We are painfully aware of problems which this daily transportation causes in the school parking lot and on Blossom Road.

The school recognizes the authority of parents to allow girls to drive to school or to ride with someone else. But we feel that warnings and restrictions should be stated here and should be acted upon in the home to minimize obvious dangers.

1. Driving to or from school each day with the boyfriend should not be permitted by parents. This practice can be an occasion of scandal or serious sin. It emphasizes the boy-girl relationship needlessly. In the morning such rides make poor preparation for the day's work.
2. In the afternoons they frequently lead to joy-rides.
3. When a student comes in a car driven by a friend she must leave the auto immediately and the car must depart promptly.
4. For safety sake parents and friends should pick up students after school in our parking lot only. Afternoon traffic on Blossom Road makes a roadside pick-up extremely dangerous.
5. Parents should not permit their daughter to ride with everybody; know whom she travels with and check on her companions. Unsafe cars driven fast by showoff boys or girls cannot be supervised once they have taken off.
