The new wing of St. Francis de Sales school, modernly constructed and equipped was completed in time for the fall opening. The four class room structure was designed by Joseph P. Flynn, architect, of Rochester.

Hilton Parish Reports \$55,346 In Fund Drive

Hilton — Pledges totaling \$55,346, nearly double the \$30,000 goal — were reported at a "victory dinner" last week by the Rev. Jacob R. Rauber, pastor of St. Leo Church, at the conclusion of the parish financial need appeal.

Funds obtained through the drive will be used to defray expenses of renovation already made to the parish property, as well as provide for costs of other projected improvements.

Highly pleased at the success of the campaign, the first major financial appeal in the history of the nine-year-old parish, Father Rauber expressed gratitude to the more than 60 men who staffed the committee, to the parishioners and friends of the parish who made pledges, and to Foley Associates Inc. of Rochester, an exclusive Catholic building organization which conducted the campaign.

Carpetmen heard an address by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey at a kickoff dinner Saturday night, Oct. 15, in the church hall, and conducted the dedication on the following Sunday afternoon.

Thomas C. Mance headed the drive committee, with George Eichas, James Kelley, George Schaller and William Schoenrigh as co-chairmen. Harley Bigler and Thomas Murphy were in charge of the special gifts group.

Renovations already made, Father Rauber said, include extension of the church to provide for an additional 150 persons; remodeling of the basement for a meeting hall and kitchen; renovation of the church choir loft, and installation of rest rooms. Still to be done are extension of the sanctuary; installation of new entrances to the church and hall; blacktopping of the parking grounds; and additional painting and decorating.

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Bishop Lane Deplores New Smile Technique

"The twentieth-century may well be the closing time of the human race," Bishop Raymond A. Lane, superior general of Maryknoll, exiled from Red China, told the faculty and students of Nazareth College in an hour long talk at the East Ave. campus, Friday afternoon.

Introduced by the Rev. William H. Shannon, college chaplain, the Bishop deplored the "smile technique" which he called today's diplomatic tendency used in international affairs. The Bishop wondered if actually we were not "being laughed at."

He called upon the young women to pray for men in public position whose decisions might mean the survival of Christianity.

THE BISHOP paid special tribute to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who stood alone, he felt, in keeping the U.S. from "losing its moral fibre" and preserving it from the "long-haired group who have the president's ear."

The Maryknoll Superior felt that our present period is the worst ever faced by this country. Bishop Lane contended that the U.S. was "sold out" at Geneva in that such diplomacy divorces the government from the people and neutrality forces each citizen to defend himself.

More and more, the Bishop stated, government leaders have taken for their rule that morality and foreign policy do not mix; that they must act purely through expediency.

Only answer to the world we live in, the Bishop said, is the state of grace and acknowledging ourselves as "adult Catholics."

AS AN ADULT Catholic, Bishop Lane said, "we must consider the importance of our own and others' salvation, have loyalty to the state of grace so that we

would rather die than commit a mortal sin and prefer to accept our daily cross of suffering than to reject it."

The Bishop cautioned his listeners in the terminology of the day, not to "get mixed up," and to "keep their feet on the ground." He said that he felt that the principles of communism would "condition the Reds for Christianity by bringing them back to fundamentals."

In closing, Bishop Lane asked prayers for peace, stating that "there is only one way of know-

ing Our Lord — talk to Him yourself."

After the Bishop's talk, Miss Barbara Belmont, president of Nazareth's Frenin Mission Unit, presented the Maryknoll prelate with a check for the work of his order's missionaries in the Far East.

The Bishop, escorted by Father Shannon and Sister Rose Angela, dean of Nazareth College, proceeded to the Students' Lounge where he continued to chat informally to the students for over an hour.
