To love the 1,000,000 pagans in Africa, Oceania, Asia and elsewhere, two distinct looks are required; one is to the Heavens, the other to the earth. And they come in this order: When Our Blessed Lord cured the deaf man, He did two things: He lifted His eyes to the Heavens, and He looked at the afflicted and sighed.

If we look to the poor and ignorant, the lepers and the starving, without first looking to the Heavens, we will not love them in God's name. Indeed if we look to the sorry of earth, without considering the Heavens, we are apt to despair at the misery we see. Heaven gives us the inspiration for sacrifice; earth the objects of our sacrifice.

Our Lord's glance into the Heavens deepened the dark shadow of misery on the earth. Evils become more real by their startling contrast to the unshadowed light. The shock that is produced as we turn from the free sweep of Heaven to the wounds of earth, prompts us to cut into our capital, to balance luxuries with sacrifices, and to sigh with practical charity at the blindness of men.

The reason you have as you read and learn the needs of our 100,000 missionaries, the hunger of India, the homelessness of the refugees of Vietnam, depends on the frequency of your look to Heaven and your desire to be one with the glorified Christ. Because you have intimacy with Heaven, you will not shrink from sighing at the spiritually blind and deaf of the earth. You will immediately say: "I want to make an act of faith in the Year of Christ, and an act of charity toward the pagan world. I will therefore send to him through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith this 'sigh' in the form of a sacrifice in union with the Saviour who sighed for my sins." Thanks for your look to Heaven, thanks for your sigh.

Community Educational Institute Held With 260 Sisters Of Mercy Attending

In keeping with the Diocesan School calendar, 260 Sisters of Mercy convened Oct. 31 for their first Community Educational Institute. The day's program opened with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass celebrated by Rev. Charles Y. Boyle, superintendent of schools, in the Motherhouse Chapel.

In his opening address Father Boyle stressed the point that the spirit of mercy is as broad as the Catholic Church itself. He pointed out that Mother McAuley, founder of the Sisters of Mercy, in her educational legacy to her daughters, made no attempt to transmit the culture of any particular country or to cater to any definite society or economic class. For this reason she refrained from outlining in detail her principles of education.

"Her spirit was all-embracing; her spiritual daughters were to carry the spirit of cheerfulness and kindness to all men in all countries, in all circumstances," he said.

REV. JEROME KLEBER, S.J., former student councilor at Canisius High School in Buffalo, was guest speaker at the morning session scheduled in the high school auditorium. Addressing the Sisters, he said, "Any education which does not start with God and end in Him is without a heart." Throughout his talk he emphasized the point "that information without formation is deformation."

While the teacher helps the pupil master the techniques of writing and speaking, of thinking grammatically and responding logically, he must help him to develop fully with a carry over into practical life with the main thesis of his talk. Rev. Richard Tormey, chaplain of Mercy Motherhouse, was chairman of the morning session.

In the afternoon session Father Kleber addressed the secondary school department with the Rev. Joseph Hogan, chaplain of Notre Dame High School, Edinboro, as chairman. In his talk on Guidance and Religion, Father Kleber stressed the point that the Catholic school teachers have been carrying on the work of guidance since the days of the Apostles. The elementary school teachers were divided into primary, intermediate, junior high and music teachers for sectional group meetings and discussions. Grade teachers from the first to the eighth took part in practical demonstrations of teaching techniques and panel discussions.

Group discussions on the practical ways to improve the work of high school students and to train more efficient graduates was a major part of the secondary school program.

HIS EXCELLENCY Bishop Kearney closed the day's program with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. In his closing remarks to the Sisters he urged them to return to their classrooms fortified by the conviction that "the teacher's desk is the great pulpit of the Catholic Church. You behind it are the priests and apostles in the finest sense of the word."
