Christmas Is Coming!

Although the Christmas season may seem remote on some of these late fall sunny days, actually now is the time to plan for Christmas in your own home and in your organization. The November 1955 issue of the Monthly Message has some excellent suggestions which I am going to pass along today, not because I am fond of using quotation marks, but because a very small percentage of our Catholic women in organizations see this excellent guidepost for their work.

In the section of Spiritual Development we read "The movement to observe Advent and Christmas in a manner in keeping with the true spirit of the season is growing each year. Our parish societies, and as individuals, should be showing examples of this proper observance of the great feast of Christ's birthday.

"Christmas is a time of joy. But Advent is a time of penance and preparation for the joy. Christmas parties during Advent are an anachronism, and definitely not in the spirit of the season. To start rejoicing in the first part of December, by parish society parties, is truly out of harmony with the liturgy of the Church. Prayer and penance before the feast, prayer and rejoicing and thanksgiving on and after the feast, should be the example to set. The Christmas cycle extends to January 28 so there is plenty of time for Christmas parties.

"OUR GOAL in this project should be first to make sure that our own Christmas is truly Christian and not smothered under the trappings of secularism. Then we should try to influence others to observe Christmas in the proper manner. Let us emphasize use of the Advent Wreath in the home; elimination of gift exchange at parties of parish societies — use the money instead for some charitable purpose.

"Restrain ourselves from Christmas spending sprees, and use some of the money to alleviate distress in our own country or abroad; outdoor home and public Nativity scenes wherever possible a Christmas crib in every home; religious good for giving; likewise Catholic books, subscriptions to Catholic magazines and papers."

The Forum for the Committee on Home and School Associations points out "In preparing for the December meeting to celebrate Our Saviour's birthday we may well accept the admonition in the Psalms 95:11:13: 'Let the heavens rejoice and let the earth be glad before the face of the Lord; because He cometh.' In so doing, we will probably seek assistance from our children's teachers in presenting effective, yet simple, Advent customs that anticipate the glorious feast of Christmas.

"THE PROGRAM MAY include the following topics: 1 The Advent Wreath; 2 preparation of the crib; 3. Christmas Eve program for the home.

"To develop the first item of the suggested program a family can demonstrate the making and use of the Advent wreath. Perhaps a wreath in the school cafeteria or in all (or some) of the classrooms will interest school children in spreading this beautiful custom throughout the neighborhood, as one of their contributions to the 'Keep Christ in Christmas' movement.

"Help-in-planning the Advent Wreath may be found in either of these publications, 'Family Advent Customs'—50c Helen McLoughlin, The Liturgical Press, Collegeville, Minn. and 'Advent Wreath Leaflets'—3c, St. Helena's Workshop, 1943 Palace Avenue, St. Paul 5, Minn.

Legion Of Mary Greet Missionary Visitors

Rochester Curia of the Legion of Mary greeted several visitors from the Mission Scenerama at the October meeting. These included Sisters Aloysious and Darnien of the Medical Missionaries of Mary, Boston, Mass.; Father La Bau, S.J., of the Catholic Medical Mission Board, New York City; and Father Cromer, C.S.P., and D'Arcy Coffey of Toronto, Canada.

Sister Aloysious described her experience with the Legion of Mary among the lepers of Nigeria, Africa while Father Cromer outlined the Convert Center in Toronto which is run by two Pauline Fathers and staffed by the members of three Legions of Mary. During 1954 the Center received 230 converts into the faith and completed the task by establishing them in their own parishes. Father La Bau inspected the drug packing operation carried on by the Junior Legion of St. Anne's for the Medical Missions and was lavish in his praise of the work being done.

ANNUAL REPORTS were received by the Curia from Mystical Rose and Mother of Christ Praesidium of St. Anne's Parish. During the past year members of Mystical Rose Praesidium made 435 home visits presenting the Christian Parenthood literature series to the parents of young children while 276 home visits explaining and urging the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart in the home were also made.

An additional 21 visits were made to patients at the County Infirmary. The praesidium also supervised the Nursery for children too young to go to Mass during the 9 and 10 o'clock Masses on Sundays, took care of the several hundred volume "Pat- Library and replenished the Church Family Book weekly.

The beginning of a new apostolic work was also reported. The praesidium has just begun door to door visitation in a Crusade for Souls. Non-Catholics are presented with the pamphlet entitled "Letter to Our Non-Catholic Neighbors and are invited to attend Inquiry Classes which will begin in November. Catholics are requested to fill out census blanks if they have not already done so and the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart in the home is explained to those who are interested.

One member of this praesidium was chairman of the Catholic Information Booth sponsored by the Curia at the Monroe County Fair in August and five other members have served as officers of Junior Praesidia.

Mother of Christ Junior Praesidium also reported that the Rummage Sale listed by College Guild will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 9 and 10, at 413 East Main Street.
