

# Seven Area Priests Named To Supervise Clothing Campaign

Appointment of seven priests as area directors of the Catholic Bishops' Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, to be held in the parishes of the Rochester Diocese during the week of Nov. 20, was announced by the Rev. E. Leo McMannus, diocesan director of the drive.

The newly-appointed directors are the Rev. Daniel V. Hogan, Monroe County; the Rev. Benedict A. Ehmann, Chemung and Schuyler Counties; the Rev. Richard A. Hart, Steuben County; the Rev. James F. Slattery, Corning; the Rev. Leo A. Jones, Cayuga County; the Rev. Otto Vogt, Tompkins and Tioga Counties; and the Rev. Emmett Halloran, Ontario, Seneca, and Yates Counties.

AS AREA directors they will supervise the promotion of the drive in their localities. "Last year at Thanksgiving time the parishes of our diocese contributed 200,000 pounds of usable clothing and shoes," said Father McMannus. "This amount helped to swell the nationwide total to almost 11,000,000 pounds. Within ninety days after the close of the drive last year the final bales and bags of clothing and shoes were on their way to the needy overseas from the ports of New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, and Tacoma."

Clothing collected in the 1954 drive was distributed in Austria, Bolivia, Egypt, Formosa, France,

Germany, Greece, Guatemala, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Italy, Korea, Lebanon, Malaya, Pakistan, the Philippines, Spain, Trieste, and Vietnam, it was pointed out.

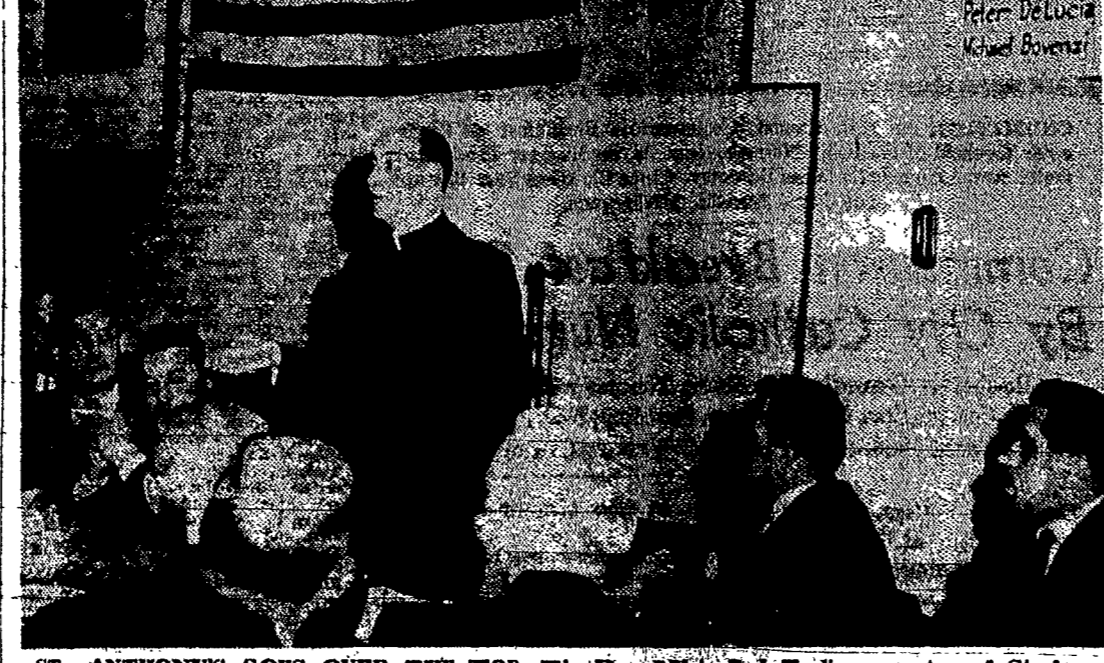
"As in the past," said Father McMannus, "we invite donations of all usable garments, cleaned and repaired where necessary. Any usable blankets or bedding, and any pair of practical shoes in good repair will be gladly received at the parish collection centers. "All types of men's and children's shoes can be used, as well as boots, overshoes, galoshes, rubbers, sneakers, and sandals. All types of practical women's shoes will be greatly appreciated, but high-heeled pumps or evening shoes obviously serve little purpose among the refugees overseas. "Men's clothing and work shoes, blankets, sheets or bedding, men's and women's underwear, clothing for children and infants, and all types of socks and stockings are of especial value."

# 200 Per Cent Of Goal Reached In St. Anthony Building Fund Drive

A total of \$301,177 in pledges—more than double the goal—was announced this week by the Rev. Michael J. Tydings, pastor of St. Anthony of Padua Church, Rochester, at the conclusion of the parish church-school fund drive.

His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey delivered the keynote address to the workers at a kickoff dinner Oct. 29 in Lorenzo's Restaurant.

More than 300 men of the parish conducted the parishwide solicitation on the following day. Frank Ridotto headed the campaign committee, with Peter DeLuca in charge of special gifts.

FUNDS FROM the campaign, representing pledges over a three-year period, will be used for construction of a new St. Anthony's School building, and subsequently a new church building, on a plot facing Jones Park, four blocks north of the present combination church-school building at Lyell and Plymouth Avenues. # 50th Anniversary Of Seton Workers To Be Celebrated

Observance of the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Seton Workers, a group of women banded together in 40 branches to do charitable work for St. Mary Hospital, Rochester, will take the form of an "open house" from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Nurses Lounge.

Sister Martina and the Sisters of Charity who staff the hospital are holding the open house to entertain the workers.

Guests of honor at tea will be His Excellency Bishop James E. Kearney; His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey; Rev. Paul Wohlrab, chaplain at St. Mary's; the former chaplains at the hospital; Frank E. Wolfe, chairman of the men's board; Mrs. Gordon A. Reitz, chairman of the women's board; Dr. Joseph A. Lane, president of the medical staff; and Dr. John Butler, educational director.

**THE SETON WORKERS** were organized in 1905 for the purpose of helping the poor in the wards of St. Mary's and were named in honor of Reverend Mother Elizabeth Seton, foundress of the Sisters of Charity in the United States. In 1932 when the women's board was formed, Mrs. Charles J. Paisley reorganized the Seton branches.

Among those who have served as chairmen of the Seton Workers through the years have been Mrs. Louis A. Whalen, Mrs. Leo F. Simpson, Mrs. William Skudt, Mrs. Paisley, Mrs. Joseph Ashe, Mrs. William Wynans, Jr., and Mrs. E. A. Hanover.

The present chairman is Mrs. Frank P. Toolan who has been in charge since 1950, during which time the branches have doubled in number. Three generations are now represented in the group, since grandchildren of some of the original members are forming branches this year.

Mrs. Richard T. Ford, who was the first secretary, is the only active original member.

Reports from the 40 branches with a membership of 600 show the varied and extensive work of these groups. Stretching and folding gauze saves the hospital several thousand dollars annually; scholarships are provided for student nurses; Christmas stockings are filled for children in the pediatric and out-patient departments; the library is staffed; books are bought, kept in repair,

and distributed to patients; girls made for the Gift Shop, and patients' trays decorated for the holidays.

Funds for these and other projects are raised by dues, card parties, baked goods, and white elephant sales. All of the above annual donations are in addition to large projects such as refurbishing the lobby, buying a Recordex and viewer and contributions to other projects of the hospital.


