Pittsford Youth Wins Letter-Writing Prize

Edward Wren, 130 Astor Drive, won second prize (\$16) in a letter-writing contest sponsored by The Catholic Boy magazine published by the Holy Cross Fathers at Notre Dame, Indiana.

His name, picture and prize-winning letter appear in the current (November) issue of the magazine. The letter was one of 918 written on the magazine's contest article in the issue of May 1955, "Yankee Slave on Molokai."

"THIS WAS the inspiring story of Joseph Dutton, soldier, railroad worker who spent the last 44 years of his life in heroic service of the lepers on Molokai. Dutton had lived a worldly, wastrel life for much of his first 40 years, but, following his conversion to Catholicism, he decided to give himself to penance and reparation."

"When I read the story of Brother Joseph Dutton I was deeply touched. Here was the story of a man given the grace to repent of his sins by helping Father Damien on Molokai. Joseph Dutton did not want to gain fame or money for his work but wanted a clean soul when he faced God after death. He labored day after day with the lepers until his death forty-five years after coming to Molokai."

"Joseph Dutton saw what Father Damien saw: that lepers are also members of Christ's Mystical Body and that lepers' souls should also have a chance to go to God."

"Many people think of people like lepers and shudder at the thought. They think of lepers as people with sores all over their bodies, with an appearance that can hardly be made out. But they do not think of lepers as good holy people. They do not think of lepers as a suffering part of the Church."

"Lepers' souls are probably a lot whiter in God's eyes than ours are. God gave these people the cross of leprosy to bear. That is why Father Damien and Joseph Dutton labored among these poor unfortunate souls. That is why we should pray for the lepers and the priests and nuns who care for them, the people who are called 'Slaves of Molokai!'"

St. Stephen's School Building Fund Nears Goal Of \$150,000 At Meeting

Geneva—St. Stephen's School Building Fund reached a total of \$147,507 in subscriptions at the third report meeting of volunteer workers on Wednesday, November 1. Approximately 175 volunteer workers gathered in DeSales gymnasium and turned in \$31,050 in pledges.

Minimum goal of the parish-wide drive is \$150,000 which is sure to be surpassed during the following week, according to Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor. PROCEEDS OF the campaign, which has been in progress for the last six weeks, will be used toward the construction of an eight-classroom school addition. The new building will be located on Elmwood Ave. and will be joined to the existing school by means of a corridor. It will be necessary, according to Father Nolan to raise three houses on Elmwood Ave. in order to make room for the new edifice. The pastor said this work is expected to get under way in the near future.

According to Father Nolan, the existing school accommodates approximately 600 pupils at the present time and the classes are overcrowded. Construction of the school addition will not only alleviate present conditions but will make it possible for increased enrollment in future years.
