Religious Schools American, Says U. S. Hierarchy

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respectively of the school attended."

The Hierarchy declared that these schools "protest" the kind of thinking which would reduce them to a secondary level, and against unfair and discriminatory treatment which would, in effect, write them off as less wholly dedicated to the public welfare than the state-supported schools.

The statement said it was "dangerous thinking" to suppose that "the existence of the private school is an infringement upon the domain of the school supported by public funds."

"The private school is a concrete demonstration of the fact that education is not a monopoly of public authority," the Bishops stated. "It should be added, moreover, that the private school provides a saving and challenging variety in the total system, beneficial to the whole and manifestly fruitful in its effects. Those who seek to abolish the private school would not only sin against justice, they would destroy something very precious in American life."

"NEITHER IS the church-related school a limitation on the right of the state to insure an educated citizenry. It exists not only to fulfill the function of education in our democratic society, but specifically to educate the Christian for his dual citizenship in time and eternity. It exists to teach not only the content of the accepted curriculum, but that which the tax-supported school under present conditions may not teach, namely, positive religion."

In stressing freedom of education, the Bishops said the right of the parents to attend to the child's education is "antecedent to any human law or institution."

"It is vested in his very nature and is demanded as a fulfillment of his actual parenthood," the statement said. "In this it reflects the inviolability of the human person and his freedom under God. It is a manifestation of the law of nature in concrete action. So it is that private and religious education in America rests upon the law of nature as well as upon the law of the land."

Notre Dame University Leader In Atomic Study

Notre Dame, Ind.—(NC)—A large and unusual do-it-yourself project is under way here at the University of Notre Dame where a group of scientists is building the atom smasher. When completed early next year, the new installation will solidify the university's standing as one of the world's leading laboratories studying the interaction of electrons with matter.

THE NEW ATOM smasher is the third of increasingly powerful electrostatic generators to be installed on the campus since 1935. Since then Notre Dame scientists have recorded several "firsts" in atomic research. In 1939, for example, they were the first to show that the atom could be disintegrated by electron bombardment. The atom smasher now being constructed in Nieuwland Science Hall, under the supervision of Dr. Bernard Waldman, director of the nuclear physics project, and Dr. Walter Miller, will be one of the strongest radiation sources in the world.

While atomic installations at some research centers may be more powerful, few will have the stability and precision of the new Notre Dame atom smasher, he said.

Dionne Quint Stricken, Forced To Leave Convent

Montreal—(NC)—Marie Dionne, the quintuplet who has left the convent where she was preparing to become a cloistered nun for the second time in 16 months, is reported suffering from "pernicious anemia."

Described as "reliable," the report came despite a news blackout at Notre Dame De L'Esperance Hospital in nearby St. Laurent.

IT WAS to this hospital, where her sisters, Cecilia and Yvonne are training as nurses, that Marie came after leaving the cloistered convent of the Servantes Du Tres Saint Sacrement in Quebec City.

Her life-long hopes to become a nun seem now to be shattered. The cloister's superiors would not comment on her departure but did indicate to N.C.W.C. News Service that they did not expect that she would again return.

From other sources it is learned that she planned to remain in the hospital for some days under observation in an effort to regain her health. Hospital authorities, however, would not permit this there.

Marie, fraillest of the quintuplets when they were born 21 years ago, first entered the cloistered community in November, 1953. Fatigue and loss of sleep, and appetite caused her to return home for a rest in July, 1954, just two weeks before the death of her quintuplet sister, Emilie.

LAST SEPTEMBER she returned to the Quebec cloister as a postulant. At that time she was reported to have been very happy at being able to return following the rest. The death of Emilie, the first break in the

Pope's Health Reported Good As 5 Years Ago

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Father appears as well as he was five years ago.

AFTER ALL, against all those who believe to have found signs of retrogression in the Pope's state of health there remains the fact that since last July 30, when the Holy Father took up residence in Castelgandolfo, up to November 11, he has given no less than 24 discourses. Many of them were of considerable length and, like the one given before tens of thousands of Catholic sportsmen and women, were delivered while standing up.

Quite apart from the mental labor involved in preparing these discourses, the physical effort required in giving them would seem a clear indication of the Pope's good physical shape.

Furthermore, at least twice each week the Holy Father has granted general audiences in Castelgandolfo, each lasting about one hour during which the Pope stands on a balcony overlooking the courtyard, greeting individually the various groups assembled, addressing them in Italian, French, German, English, Spanish and sometimes Dutch. It seems difficult to reconcile this with alleged signs of feebleness.

IN ADDITION, the Holy Father has received large numbers of privileged individuals, such as Cardinals, Bishops, prelates, diplomats, in private audiences. He has carried on the what one might call "routine" activities of his duties as head of the Church. He has made quite a number of automobile trips to Rome for special occasions and events. In short, he has worked as much, as hard and as long as he ever did before. And if he did all this while physically enfeebled, his power of dissimulation is truly amazing.

There is no doubt that the Pope by virtue of his personal life, fortified by the immense re-

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
