the Holy Father took up residence in Castelgandolfo, up to November 11, he has given no less than 24 discourses. Many of them were of considerable length and, like the one given before tens of thousands of Catholic sportsmen and women, were delivered while standing up. Quite apart from the mental abor involved in preparing these discourses, the physical effort required in giving them would seem a clear indication of the Pope's good physical shape. Furthermore. at least twice each week the Holy Father has granted general audiences in Castelgandolfo, each lasting about one hour during which the Pope stands on a balcony over-

looking the courtyard, greeting individually the various groups assembled, addressing them in Italian, French, German, Englih, Spanish and sometimes Dutch. It seems difficult to reconcile this with alleged signs

of feebleness. IN ADDITION, the Holy Father has received large numbers of privileged individuals, such as Cardinals, Bishop's, prelates, diplomats, in private audiences. He has carried on the-what one hesitates to call---"routine" activ. ities of his duties as head of the Church. He has made quite a number of automibile trips to Rome for special occasions and events. In short, he has worked as much, as hard and as long as he ever did before. And if he did all this while physically enfeebled, his power of dissimulation is truly amazing.
