Mother Sylvester Dies In Elmira

Mother M. Sylvester Tindell, third General Superior of the Rochester Sisters of St. Joseph, died Wednesday, Nov. 23, 1955 at St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira in the 79th year of her religious life....

Word of Mother Sylvester's death was received as this issue of the Catholic Courier Journal was going to press.

GENERAL SUPERIOR of her order from 1921 to 1939, Mother Sylvester died at the age of 94. Funeral Mass will be celebrated. at Nazareth Motherhouse, Pittsford on Saturday morning, Nov. 26, at 10 o'clock. Mother Sylvester was born in

Geneva, the daughter of Lawrence and Maria Tindell. She entered the Sisters of St. Joseph in 1877 and taught at Nazareth Academy and the Old Cathedral High School As Sister Sylvester, she found-

ed and became first superior of the convents at St. Mary's, Elmira, St. Patrick's, Corning, and St. Paul's, Oswego. In 1913, Mother Sylvester was
