Cardinal Mooney who prior to Aug. 1, 1937 had been fourth Bishop of Rochester, was named a Cardinal on Dec. 23, 1945 and the public consistory at which Pope Pius XII conferred the red hat took place Feb. 21, 1946.

The Cardinal-elect was accompanied to the consistory by the present Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey of Rochester, who had served as Cardinal Mooney's secretary when Bishop of Rochester.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF Cardinal Mooney as leader of the Detroit archdiocese are recorded at length in the Detroit Catholic newspaper.

Citing his "vigorous and prudent leadership," the writer notes that Cardinal Mooney joining with his fellow Bishops of Michigan organized a provincial major seminary and supervised its erection.

The Cardinal-Archbishop channeled the offerings of the faithful into the Archdiocesan Development Fund "which has facilitated the expansion of the religious, educational and social services of the Archdiocese. Sixty-five new parishes were organized during the 10 years."

Other accomplishments include strengthening the Archdiocesan charities department by increasing the number of professionally trained priests and lay workers and by providing new building facilities.

The Cardinal-Archbishop has directed the work of teaching religion to children not in parish schools, the Catholic Youth Organization, the missions and Catholic Action, the Catholic press and other activities.

CARDINAL MOONEY has also made substantial contribution to the Church's welfare and progress at the national level, the article said.

"His great intellectual gifts, his innate attractive personality, his natural quality of leadership, and his wide and varied experience in the Royal diplomatic service have always impelled his brother Bishops to seek his practical and prudent counsel," the paper said.

Legion Honors Edward Esse

He and Craig C. Smith, president of Paraxin Corp., 408 Mill St. were presented with citations. The Legion said Esse "has been especially helpful by placing each week an average of four veterans, one of them a disabled veteran."

According to the Legion, 75 percent of the Paraxin Corp. employees are veterans and of these 41 percent are disabled. Smith, the Legion said, is largely responsible for the policy of hiring veterans.

New Precious Blood School Slates Open House Sunday

Open house in the newly constructed four-room school building of Most Precious Blood Parish on Stenson St. near Lexington Ave. will be held Sunday, Jan. 8 from 2 to 4 p.m.

The Rev. Sebastian Contigiacco, C.P.P.S., pastor will be on hand to greet parents, relatives and friends of the pupils and the general public.

The school was opened with 60 children and the first four grades are being taught. Sister M. Valerian, of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph is principal.

NEED FOR THIS school has been realized for a long period and the parish in March of last year conducted a campaign for \$25,000 which resulted in more than \$30,000 to be added to funds realized in other activities to build the school. Cost of the school is estimated at \$95,000.

The parish marked its 25th anniversary at a Solemn High Mass on March 6, 1935.

Father Sebastian was present at the church's dedication, March 2, 1930 and served as assistant until 1937 when he was named pastor.

The school was planned and built under his direction.
