### Trophy Honors Jesuit Magic

Opauka, Neb. — (NC) — The Omaha Magical Society, composed of amateur magicians in this area, has established a memorial trophy in honor of one of its best-known members, Father Charles K. Mayday, S.J., who died in September, 1954.

The society established the trophy at its annual Christmas party here where tribute was paid to the former Jesuit, one-time dean of men and professor of physics at Creighton University.

Purpose of the "Father Hayden Memorial Trophy," according to John K. Hope, vice-president, is "to encourage and promote better magic in the group on which Father Hayden had such an important influence for many years."

### Chinese Catholics Arrested Protested

Manila — (NC) — Asian Catholics have registered a strong protest to the arrest of hundreds of Chinese Catholics by their communist government last September. In telegrams to Dag Hammarskjold, Secretary General of the United Nations, and Carlos Romulo, permanent Philippine delegate to the U.N., and Ambassador to the United States.

In the telegram they urged the United Nations to take immediate action against the "violent persecution and inhuman treatment by the Chinese Reds in arresting Bishops Ignatius Kung of Shanghai, Bishop Joseph Ho of Tachow, 98 priests, 56 seminarians, 20 nuns, 12 brothers, and 4,000 Chinese Catholic leaders.

The telegram was signed by Dr. Jose M. Hernandez, president of Philippine Catholic Action, and sent on behalf of the First Asian Meeting of representatives of the International Lay Apostolate which met here.

### Brochure Offered Entrants In Kodak National High School Photo Contest

Two pieces of literature aimed at acquainting amateur photographers with what goes into a prize-winning contest entry are now available for those interested in the National High School Photographic Awards. Both are offered free of charge by the Eastman Kodak Company, sponsor of the contest.

The first item is a six-page brochure of helpful hints. It tells what types of subjects the contest-entitled high schooler should be thinking about, explains what the judges look for, and gives a round-up of suggestions for submitting winning entries. Also available is a booklet showing the sixteen top-winning pictures from the previous contest.

THE 1956 CONTEST for students in grades 9-12 in parochial, public, and private schools will run through March 31, 1956. Students may enter as many prints as they wish in each of the following classes: (1) School Activities (including sports); (2) People All Ages (away from school); (3) Pictorials (scenic, still life, tableau arrangements, etc.); and (4) Animals and Pets (domestic and wild life).

For each category, there will be a grand prize of \$300, second of \$200, and a third worth \$100. In addition four special awards of \$50 each will be made along with 240 \$10 honorable mention awards.

WINNERS WILL be announced in May of 1956. As in previous years, a selection of prize-winning prints will be made into a traveling color for use by schools free of charge.

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

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
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
