

Clothing Collection Nets Record Total For Needy

The Thanksgiving Clothing Collection for the needy of the world, conducted in the Rochester Diocese during last Thanksgiving week, amassed a record quarter of a million pounds of clothing, bedding, and shoes, according to the final report this week by the Rev. E. Leo McManus, diocesan director.

THE TOTAL of 250,668 pounds contributed and packed in 7,354 cartons represents an increase of 21 tons over the 1954 collection.

In issuing the report, Father McManus expressed his sincere appreciation to all priests in the diocese who cooperated with him, and to all who donated so generously.

Throughout the diocese 133 parishes and two institutions took part in the drive. The largest parish donation in the diocese was that of Sacred Heart Cathedral, with 17,945 pounds of clothing contributed. St. Mary Church, Auburn, with 6,831 pounds, made the largest contribution of the churches outside the city of Rochester.

Of the 133 parishes contributing \$1 showed increases over their previous contributions in 1954. Parishes of the diocese which revealed proportionately large increases over their previous year's totals were led by St. Helen, Rochester (3,200 pounds), which quadrupled its 1954 donation. Parishes which tripled their contributions were Sacred Heart Cathedral (17,945 pounds), St. Joseph, Westport (800 pounds), and St. Bridget (1,850 pounds), as well as St. Bernard Seminary (1,126 pounds).

Eleven parishes doubled the amounts of their previous contributions: St. Columba, Caladonia (445 pounds), St. Plus, Croton (375 pounds), St. Gregory, Marion (250 pounds), St. Joseph, Wayland (515 pounds), St. Rita, West Webster (1,022 pounds), St. Mary of the Lake, Watkins Glen (1,500 pounds), St. Margaret Mary, Rochester (8,207 pounds), St. Mary, Auburn (6,832 pounds), St. Patrick, Danville (630 pounds), St. James, Waverly (1,010 pounds), and St. Ann, Rochester (2,902 pounds).

Expenses of the shipment of the clothing to the Catholic Relief Services — N.C.W.C. warehouses in the Bronx were borne by the individual parishes. The Foreign Operations Administration made available the ocean transportation of the clothing, and the actual distribution of the clothing to the needy abroad is now being directed by the overseas personnel of the Catholic Relief Services.

Budenz Opens Niagara Series

Niagara University, N. Y. — Louis F. Budenz, former managing editor of the "Daily Worker" and for many years a leading member of the communist party in the United States, will open Niagara University's centennial year lecture series in the university student center on Jan. 17.

Charles R. Maroux, chairman of the speaker's committee of the university's student council, sponsors of the series, said that Budenz would speak on "Communist Tactics in the Field of Communication."

Budenz, who started the world in 1945 with the announcement that he was leaving the communist party to return to the Catholic Church, is considered an authority on communism and communist tactics, having served as a party leader for many years prior to his separation from the party in 1945.

After leaving the party, Budenz taught economics at Notre Dame University and later began a series of speaking tours, which took him through every section of the United States and Canada. From October 1950 to July 1951, he covered 47,000 air miles to keep lecture engagements in which he informed the American public of the "World Conquest Aims" and "Techniques" of the communist party.

Budenz is currently a member of the faculty of Fordham University and resides in Crestwood, N. Y.
