Dime Banking Sets Record

Fred W. Erath, president of the Dime Banking and Loan Association, 141 Clinton Ave. N., reported today in his annual statement that the association profits hit a new high.

Erath listed highlights of the thrift and home financing institution's 1955 operations as follows:

- Net savings increased by \$438,072.98, bringing the grand total savings of \$4,369,467.18.
- Number of savings account holders increased to 4,022.
- Dividends paid out to savers totaled \$103,886.75.
- Home loans increased both in number and amount to a new high of \$4,485,025.08, an increase of \$450,607.64.
- Reserves and undivided profits increased to an all-time high of \$688,394.65.

Erath forecast an unusually good year for business in 1956, especially for the first six months. As for housing, Erath reported that demand continues strong, being sustained by "an intense desire on the part of the public for up-to-date and larger homes, a rising rate of disposable personal income, and a continued high rate of family formation."
