"The letters that come to my desk from young men and women who are working as volunteers on our Indian missions," says Monsignor Cullen of the Marquette League for Catholic Indian Missions, "almost without exception say, 'I've never been so happy—I hate to leave here.'"

"Most Catholics," continued the Monsignor, "have experienced the spiritual glow which comes from making a sacrifice for the Divine Saviour, but city boys and girls who go to the missions, add to their spiritual happiness, the adventure of living in an entirely different environment from any other in the United States and the satisfaction of working with children who win your respect, Indian children are very obedient, dignified, integrity, and a capacity for joyful living."

"All types of workers are needed by our large schools for Indian children," reports Monsignor Cullen. "If you are a cook, carpenter, teacher, nurse, handyman, or an office worker and can afford to give two months of your time to carrying out Our Lord's command, 'Go, teach all nations,' write to the Marquette League, 228 Fourth Avenue, New York 10, N. Y., and we will find a place for you."

Over the years various projects have been carried out by home visitation but currently the main work is the urging of families to have the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart, a long term familiarization of new parents with the Christian Parent-hood literature, and a parish wide convert campaign.

Father Naughton was recently commended by the National Center for the Enthronement of the Sacred Heart on the large number of Enthronements which he performed last year.

The junior Praesidia visit the County Infirmary and nursing homes, supervise noon hour recreation at the parish school, help operate the Sunday nursery, and have packed and shipped over a ton of sample medicine to the medical missions during the past year.
