

## Pope Honors 22 Priests Of Rochester Diocese

Very Rev. Msgr. J. Emmett Murphy, S.M., ordained in 1939, is prefect of discipline at St. Bernard's Seminary where he was appointed a professor in 1947. He teaches special moral theology and canon law. Prior to

his seminary appointment, he was an assistant pastor at Blessed Sacrament parish, Rochester, Sacred Heart Cathedral, and at Geneva's St. Francis de Sales Church. He also served as an Army chaplain during World War II with American armed forces in the Near East, attaining the rank of major.

Very Rev. Msgr. John E. McCafferty, J.C.D., ordained in 1945 following studies at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, received a doctorate in canon law from Catholic University, Washington. He served as assistant pastor at St. Mary's, Canandaigua, Immaculate Conception, Rochester, and director of the Family and Child Care Division of the Rochester Catholic Charities. Monsignor McCafferty is official of the diocesan matrimonial tribunal.

## Fordham Increases Teachers' Salaries

New York —(NC)— Fordham University will increase faculty salaries by approximately 14 per cent above the existing scale, it was announced here. The new scale will range from a minimum of \$4,000 for beginning instructors to \$10,000 for full professors, with provision for special professorships above the normal maximum.

In making the announcement, Father Laurence J. McGinley, S.J., president, disclosed that the funds for the increase would come from three main sources: 1) the total income from the recent Ford Foundation grant of \$1,845,500; 2) from "other endowments and grants; and 3) from an increase in the basic tuition rate of the undergraduate schools "with proportionate changes in the graduate schools and special courses."

## Enters Convent

Philadelphia — (RNS) — Major Claire J. McDonald of Wilkes-Barre Pa., has given up her career after 10 years as an officer in the U.S. Air Force to enter a convent and become a nun. She has begun her novitiate at the convent of the Handmaids of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in suburban Wynona. Miss McDonald served in the Army Air Force during World War II, and was recalled to active duty in 1948 to take an important administrative role in the Air Force's reorganization as an independent branch of the military service.

A book with a tonic effect on fervor is the best sort of company for Lent. Every Catholic bookstore is offering a generous variety — books new and unusual and good, books old and tried and sure — some solidly doctrinal, some helpfully making the applications of doctrine to personal life.

A fair sampling of the new:

**E. BOYD BARRITT, A SHEPHERD WITHOUT SHEEP**. Bruce '56. 143 pp. \$2.75. Confessions of a man who has known failure, yet walks with Christ. Stories of people with big and little problems. A book with a wide apostolate.

**H. VAN ZELLER, O.S.B., THE OUTSPOKEN ONES**. Sheed '55. 195 pp. \$3.00. Lives of 12 minor prophets deftly re-created, and each one turned directly and gently into a soul-searching talk with a father-confessor. Superb style. For minor souls, major souls, students, even scholars.

**A. McGRANN, O.M.L., IN HIM WE LIVE: THE GOOD WORD FOR TODAY**. Bruce '56. 365 pp. \$3.45. Little one-page sermons, introduced with a New Testament text and a moving anecdote, rounded off with a memorable word from Augustine or Jerome or Basil, or the limitation. A pleasure to open, and stays with you when closed.

**F. D. JORET, O.P., THE EUCHARIST AND THE CONFESIONAL**. Newman '56. 192 pp. \$3.50. The sound doctrine of a Saint Thomas interpreted with uncton by one of the sons of St. Dominic. The author has well expressed his aim: "to let the sacred face of our adorable Master preside over every chapter . . . that the reader may frequently pause . . . to look up and gaze with love upon that holy countenance."

**Jesuit Fathers of St. Mary's Kansas, THE CHURCH TEACHERS: Documents of the Church in English Translation**. Herder. '55. 400 pp. \$5.75. Four Jesuit Fathers working under the direction of Rev. Gerald Van Ackeren, S.J., here present the teaching voice of the Church, pronouncements and encyclicals of the utmost importance, degrees of Church councils from earliest times to the present, readably translated from the Greek and Latin and neatly indexed. Priest or student may quickly find a needed passage—the canons on penance, the errors of Master Eckhardt, the letter of the Holy Office to Archbishop Cushing of Boston on the recent controversy. . . . the things one lets go because so often the source is inaccessible.

**WINFRID HERRST, S.D.S., INDULGENCES**. Bruce '55. 103

pp. Paper, \$1.50. A useful work, stimulating to practical fervor, and a good reference book for layman or priest. Pages 31-34 give a full explanation of the Heretic Act, which all can make — and how it works if one momentarily forgets and claims an indulgence for oneself!

**Cyprian Truss, O.F.M. Cap., SAY IT WITH STORIES**. 189 pp. \$3.95. J. Wagner, Inc. '55. A speech-builder, a sermon-aid; all the tried and true stories of the famous preacher and broadcaster has used in years of apostolic work, their subjects arranged alphabetically. Some are as old as Adam—like the reply of Jim to the query as to what he had given up for Lent. "I'm just giving up, that's all," he said.

**ABBE COURTOIS, AN HOUR WITH JESUS: Meditations for Religious**. Newman, '56. 161 pp. \$3.00. Meant for teaching religious; inspiring. In close touch with realities. Now in its second printing, and beautifully translated by Sr. Helen Madeline, S.N.D. Ten chapters, each with a page of serious discussion, then a full meditation, a free and prolonged colloquy, an examen (this too of generous length, really exploratory), a series of resolutions, and a prayer. A golden book. Read the chapter on Joy: "Resolutions . . . Not to let a day pass without asking from God the grace of a happy disposition and interior joy . . . To make an inventory of all the divine favors granted to me, and to give thanks . . . To simplify the tragic, and not to let simple things assume the tragic . . . To get a little fresh air, to keep silent a while . . . To make others feel they have good in them . . ."

## UN Aids Catholic Hospital in Korea

United Nations, N.Y. —(NC)— The Benedictine Fathers have received a \$3,000 grant for equipment and furnishings for a hospital in Korea from the United Nations Reconstruction Agency. The money will be spent to help equip the Benedictine Sisters hospital in Tegu.

## Protestant Group Seen Red Target

Sydney, Australia —(NC)— One of the main targets in the communist war against religion is the World Council of Churches, Protestant organization whose central committee recently met here, the Sydney Catholic Weekly has warned.

The Reds, the newspaper said, have planted people to subvert the Council in various parts of the world. One of these, it continued, is Dr. Joseph Hromadka of Czechoslovakia, who told the newsmen during the central committee's meeting here that he believes in the co-existence of Christianity and communism.

DR. HROMADKA, who is dean of the Protestant seminary in Prague, "is a conscious or unconscious tool of the Soviet scheme" to subvert the Council, the Catholic Weekly stated.

The newspaper added that he is "a pawn of the Soviet-established Religious Corniform, which is the instrument for achieving the anti-religious objectives of Moscow in devious and subtle ways, at times working in the middle of unsuspecting and misled churchmen —"

Christian Jewish and Moslem." MEMBERS WHO silently accept Dr. Hromadka's presence on the council's central committee were severely criticized by the Catholic Weekly. It was also critical of the committee's decision to hold its next meeting in Red-dominated Hungary.

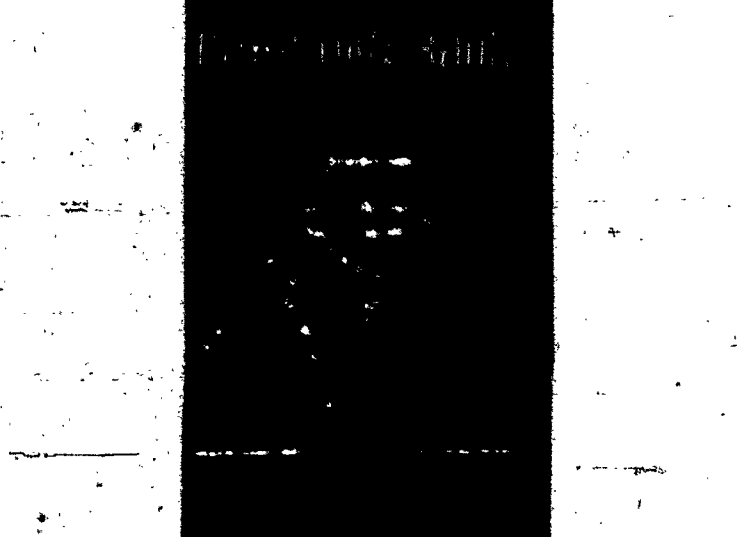
Because of this decision, it said, "it is difficult to escape the view that the World Council will be walking right into the Red lion's mouth and giving the Religious Corniform its best avenue of exploitation thus far."
