At meetings of the curia annual reports were accepted from Queen of the Holy Rosary Praesidium of Holy Family Parish, Queen of Apostles Praesidium of St. Peter and Paul Parish, and Our Lady Help of Christians Praesidium of St. Monica Parish.
An important work of all three praesidia was visitation of the sick and shut-ins on the parishes, both in homes and at the County

Hospital. All also contacted Puerto Rican families, to urge them to attend a special Mass for them at the K. of C. Many other widely diversified works were accomplished.
Queen of Apostles Praesidium reported a conducted tour, in which the pastor and spiritual director, Rev. Robert J. Fox, led a group through the church, explaining its architecture and answering questions about the altar, vestments, statues and liturgy. Prior to the tour, members had visited all neighbors, both Catholic and non-Catholic.
MEMBERS OF THIS praesidium also invited couples who had contracted mixed marriages to attend an information class, arranged a talk for fathers of seventh and eighth grade children on the children's spiritual development, visited homes of lepers Catholics, made visitations to organize a convert class, visited parents of prospective members of the kindergarten class, served at the Catholic Information Booth at the Monroe County Fair, and distributed pamphlets in the church vestibule during Lent.
Members of Our Lady Help of Christians Praesidium, under the guidance of its spiritual director, the Rev. Gerald T. Connor, made census calls, supervised the parish pamphlet rack, assisted at the Mission Scenarium and at the Information Booth at the Monroe County Fair, introduced the Apostleship of Prayer in the parish, and arranged transportation to and from the weekly religious instructions for children attending public schools. In this latter instance, only the arrangements were made by Legionaries, and the actual work was done by women of the parish.
Members of Queen of the Holy Rosary Praesidium under the spiritual direction of the pastor, Rev. George J. Schmitt, invited non-Catholic friends to attend Mass, placed posters in store windows urging family Communion on the feast of the Holy Family, distributed Missals at Sunday Mass, visited parents of children up to three years of age and parents of prospective first Communicants attending public schools, visited adults who were about to be confirmed, and arranged a party for them and their sponsors, at which slides on the Sacrament of Confirmation were shown.

George O'Marra Services Held

Funeral services for George L. O'Marra, rural mail carrier, former postmaster and store proprietor, were held in the Holy Cross Church, Ovid, Wednesday morning, Feb. 1, with the Very Rev. Msgr. Joseph J. Sullivan, pastor, as celebrant of the Requiem Mass.
Members of the American Legion Post 663, Ovid, and Ovid-Willard Post 6022, VFW, and Romulus Post 8033, VFW, acted as a military escort and conducted rites at the cemetery in Ovid.
Mr. O'Marra, who was 66, died Saturday, Jan. 28, 1956 in the Roswell Memorial Park Hospital, Buffalo, where he had been a patient for several weeks. The son of Patrick and Catherine Killen O'Marra, he was born in the township of Varick, and had always resided in this community.
In 1912, he and his brother, John, acquired the Stone store in this village and conducted a grocery and general store for several years. In 1935 he was appointed postmaster and continued in that post until 1940 when he accepted a transfer to Rural Route No. 1. He had served in that capacity until his illness in July 1955 forced him to retire from active duty.
He served in France during World War I and took part in the Argonne Forest and Chateau Thierry sectors. He was a former organist and choir leader in Sacred Heart Church in Romulus. He was a member of the American Legion and VFW posts in Ovid and the Seneca Rural Letter Carriers Association. Mr. O'Marra's wife, Mrs. Frances Hammond O'Marra, died in 1937. He is survived by two sons, Alfred, Romulus; Richard, Churchville; a sister, Mrs. Leo J. Flynn, Romulus; a granddaughter, Theresa O'Marra, Romulus; two grandsons, Richard O'Marra, Jr., and Thomas O'Marra, Churchville; four nieces, Mrs. Kenneth Roseberry, Rochester; Mrs. Rose Garrison, Geneva; Mrs. William Marion, Waterloo, and Mrs. William Flood, Corning.
The bearers at the funeral were Charles McGuire, Earl Ward, George McGure, Andrew Hamblin, James O'Connell, Sr. and Joseph Trainor.
