HOLY THURSDAY—Solemn Pontifical Mass of the Blessing of the Holy Oils will be celebrated by His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney at 9 a.m. A Low Mass will be celebrated at 5:30 p.m. and Bishop Casey will celebrate the Solemn Pontifical Mass of the Last Supper at 7:45 p.m. Holy Communion will be given at the 5:30 and 7:45 p.m. Masses only.

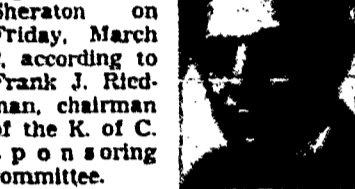
GOOD FRIDAY—The Three Hours Service, including sermons on the Seven Last Words of Christ by Rev. Daniel Hupf, C.P., will be conducted from 1 until 3 p.m. At 3 p.m. Bishop Kearney will celebrate the Solemn Liturgy commemorating the Passion and Death of our Lord. Holy Communion will be given at this 3 p.m. service.

HOLY SATURDAY—The Solemn Easter Vigil will begin at 11 p.m. and will include the blessing of the new fire, paschal candle, baptismal water, removal of baptismal veils, and litany. At midnight, Solemn Pontifical Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Casey. St. Bernard's Seminary Choir will sing at the solemn ceremonies of Holy Week in the Cathedral. The students of St. Bernard's will attend these functions and have charge of the ceremonies.

There will be no Pontifical Mass on Easter morning.

Jesuit Alumni To Honor Founder, Local Group Lists McQuaid Breakfast

Alumni from 28 Jesuit colleges will gather fraternally in 150 United States cities to honor the Father of Jesuit Education, St. Ignatius Loyola, on Sunday, March 11. Joining in the observance, alumni of Jesuit colleges in the Rochester area will gather at McQuaid Jesuit High School for Mass and a Communion breakfast.

The Mass will be celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney at 9 a.m. in the school chapel, Elmwood Ave. and Clinton Ave. South.

The observance on March 11 will find all friendly rivalries between Jesuit schools suspended, all academic and athletic feuds forgotten.

More than 600,000 Jesuit alumni are being invited to attend the Mass and Communion breakfasts which will commemorate the fourth centenary of the death of St. Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus.

THE TWELVE-MONTH period preceding July 31, 1956 has been named the Ignatian Year in honor of the saint who died in Rome on July 31, 1556. Representatives of Jesuit Alumni Associations met last summer at Bretton Woods, New Hampshire, and decided on this nationwide Communion breakfast as a tribute from all those who share the common bond of Jesuit training.

March 11 was selected as the date for the breakfast because it is the Sunday closest to the date of the canonization of St. Ignatius, who was canonized along with St. Francis Xavier on March 12, 1622.

St. Ignatius was originally a soldier. Born of noble blood, he became an officer in the Spanish army and served in that capacity until 1521. In that year, while campaigning against the French at Pampluna in northern Spain, he was struck by a cannon ball which shattered his leg and necessitated a long period of convalescence. It was during this convalescence that his mind turned from thoughts of things military to the problems of the spirit.

UPON RECOVERY from his wound and after a time of prayerful thought, he recruited a group of six companions and entered upon studies in Paris, after which, with four additional comrades, they proceeded to Rome and offered themselves to the Pope, under the title, "The Company of Jesus," for assignment to whatever duties he might choose.

In September, 1540, the then Pope, Paul III, issued a Papal Bull establishing the "Society of Jesus" as an order of the Catholic Church. St. Ignatius Loyola was chosen as the first General—the name which still designates the Superior of the Society today.

In a short time the Society became noted for achievement in two important fields—education and missionary work. For many years it founded colleges and universities throughout the length and breadth of Europe and its missionary activities flourished. By 1770, Jesuits conducted 669 colleges and 273 missions.

DURING THE 400 years of its existence, the Society of Jesus has produced 23 canonized saints. Among these canonized are: Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Order; Francis Xavier, "The Mis-

sionary Saint" who carried the Gospel to India and Japan; Robert Bellarmine and Peter Canisius, both Doctors of the Universal Church; Peter Claver, famed missionary among the negro slaves; and the eight martyrs of North America.

Under its present Father General, the Very Rev. John B. Janssens, S.J., the Society of Jesus today number 30,500 men. Almost 7,000 of this number are from the 10 provinces of the United States.

Present day American Jesuits are continuing the traditional educational and missionary work of the Society.

More than 1,000 American Jesuits are foreign missionaries in China, India, Iraq, Japan, the Philippines, the islands of the Pacific and Caribbean, and Alaska. On the home front, Jesuits conduct 28 colleges and universities, 42 preparatory and high schools in 22 states and the District of Columbia.

'Benefits Due Students' Holy Name Union Told

All American children should receive health and welfare benefit, irrespective of the school they attend, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, diocesan superintendent of schools, told delegates to the Rochester Deanery Holy Name Union winter meeting at St. Michael Church Hall, Sunday.

Monsignor Boyle spoke at sessions at which officers of the deanery were elected. Arthur F. Ennis was named to succeed Frank J. Lange as president. Lange presided.

"No future American citizen should be penalized because his parents exercise their constitutional right to patronize the school of their choice," Monsignor Boyle said.

"IN THE NAME OF democracy there are those who would reduce the traditional American pattern of education to the monolithic, all-embracing, state-dictated system such as existed in Nazi Germany under Hitler and exists in Russia today.

"No thinking American wants a single party government, by the same token no thinking American wants a single school system," the superintendent of schools said.

"Unity, not uniformity is the American ideal," he declared. "It is divisive to be a Democrat, a Republican, a Rotarian or a member of the 'Elks'. Some people who pride themselves on being liberal in everything else are most illiberal when it comes to education.

"It is true Catholic schools cost much. In money, in the life-blood of its teachers, in sacrifice but it is worth all this and more for it means the fashioning of human minds and the shaping of human hearts after the mind and heart of Jesus Christ."

THE MEETING OPENED with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament in St. Michael Church with the Very Rev. Msgr. Joseph E. Vogt, pastor of Holy Redeemer Church officiating. Assisting were the Rev.
