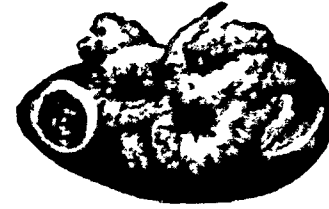

3 Priests Address DCCW Book Week Tea

Steuben Deanery, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women heard talks by the Rev. John L. Coonan of Rochester, the Rev. Robert C. MacNamara of Pittsford and the Rev. Leo A. Mans of Hornell at a Catholic Book Week tea last Sunday at St. Ann School.

Father Coonan, former assistant pastor of St. Ann's and first spiritual director of the Steuben Deanery, reviewed "Ambassador in Chains" by Bishop Raymond A. Laue, superior-general of the Maryknoll Missioners.

The book tells the story of Bishop Patrick Joseph Byrne, a Maryknoll Missioner who was martyred by North Korean Communists. He was born in Washington, D.C. and spent his early life with an aunt in Auburn. Father Coonan is a native of Auburn, so the early portion of the book held especial interest for him, he told the group.

The book traces Patrick Joseph Byrne's life through his ordination at a Baltimore seminary and his becoming, shortly afterwards, a Maryknoll Missioner. He first was assigned to a mission at Korea where he endeavored himself to the people by his warmth and humor.

THE CLIMAX of the book concerns Bishop Byrne's capture and forced march for miles in bitter weather. There were hundreds in the first lap of the march but only 12 persons left when the prison camp destination was reached. Those who dropped from exhaustion were shot.

Bishop Byrne's attitude toward his imminent death was expressed in his words, with which Father Coonan concluded his review. "I am happy. I have prayed always that I might be able to die for my Faith."

Father MacNamara, also a former assistant pastor of St. Ann's Church and spiritual director of the Steuben Deanery, selected Margaret Trouncer's book, "The Nun" for his review.

THE BOOK is a novelized biography of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque who is best known for her dedication to the increase of knowledge and love of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

St. Margaret Mary lived a life devoid of many simple human consolations. Father MacNamara related. Despite many acts of unkindness from sympathetic relatives, her girlhood was strangely happy because of her devotion to her immediate family.

Brief descriptions of better known Catholic magazines and newspapers were given by Father Mans, assistant pastor of St. Ann's.

He displayed sample copies of several magazines and Catholic weekly newspapers, commenting on features peculiar to each.

Books and pamphlets which contain matter in accordance with Catholic teachings bear the words "nulli obstat." Father Mans explained. In conclusion he summarized the importance of good Catholic literature for self-knowledge and for diffusing information regarding the Church.

THE SPEAKERS were introduced by the Rev. Richard A. Hart, spiritual director of the Steuben Deanery.
