

Fr. Cleary Urges Reading Of Catholic Periodicals

Corning — The annual Book Tea of Court St. Joseph, Catholic Daughters of America, a week ago was attended by 125 members who heard a talk by the Rev. Thomas K. Cleary,

former assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church and now assigned to George Junior Republic. The priest centered his talk around Catholic literature, including novels, newspapers and magazines.

FATHER CLEARY stressed that the most important and accurate way to keep in touch with various activities of the church and organizations was through the Catholic weekly understanding of the church coming from articles appearing periodically.

"It is most important that we acquaint ourselves with good literature," he said. "This does not necessarily have to be in the form of a big leather bound book, but can be found in pocket form, inexpensive books, he explained. The life of Christ and many editions of the lives of saints have been printed in pocket form. These are lighter forms of literature but are good reading. There is certainly no need for anyone to read some of the trash put on news stands. There are enough good magazines and newspapers to take the place of these. Parents should take a look at the kind of literature being read by their children. They should see that good books are available in the home."

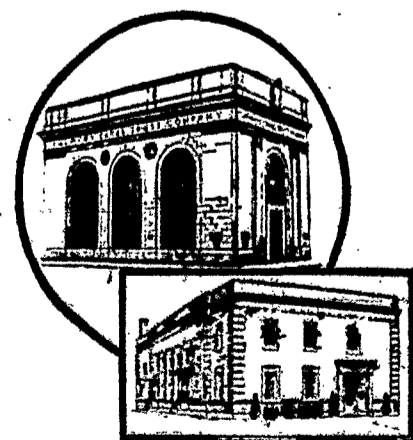
Lenten Masses Offered In Plant

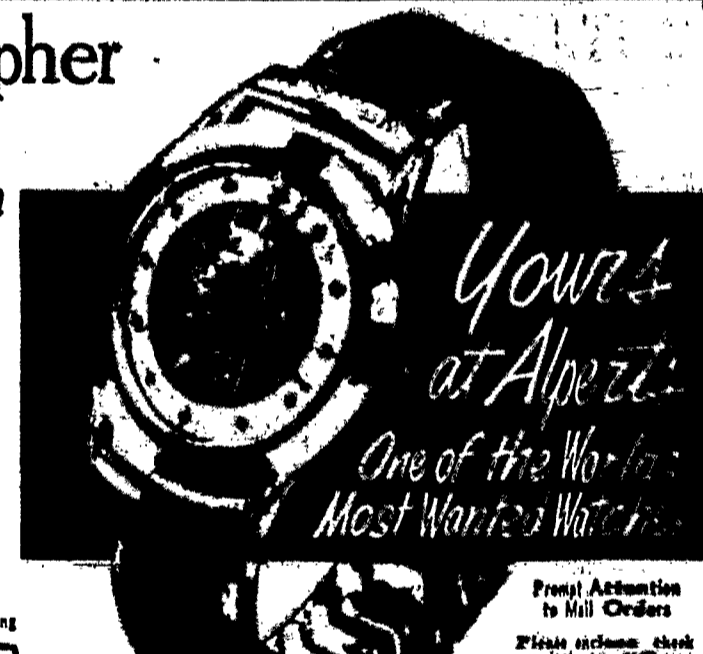
