## Bp. Kearney To Celebrate Jesuit Anniversary Mass

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will be celebrant and preacher at the Jesuit alumni Mass in honor of St. Ignatius Loyola in St. Francis Xavier Chapel at McQuaid Jesuit High School on Sunday March 11, at 9 a.m.

Following the Mass, Rev. Charles F. X. Dolan, S.J., will be guest speaker at the breakfast in the school cafeteria. Father Dolan, who is well known for his retreats and frequent radio appearances on the Sacred Heart program, is at present a member of the Mission Band of the New York Jesuits.

ANNOUNCEMENTS of the speakers was made by Rev. James R. Barnett, S.J., rector of McQuaid Jesuit High School. Father Barnett said that approximately 500 Jesuit college alumni now residing in the Rochester area have been invited to attend the breakfast. Included are representatives of 14 colleges and universities. Chairman of the local committee is Honorable James F. B. Duffy, Georgetown University, D.C.

The Rochester ceremonies are part of a nationwide observance to be held in 150 cities throughout the United States on March 11, to memorialize the 400th anniversary of the death of St. Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Jesuits. Invitations to take part in the tribute have been sent to 600,000 alumni of the 28 Jesuit conducted colleges and universities in the United States. The celebration is part of a worldwide Ignatian Year, extending from Aug. 1, 1955, through July 31, 1956.

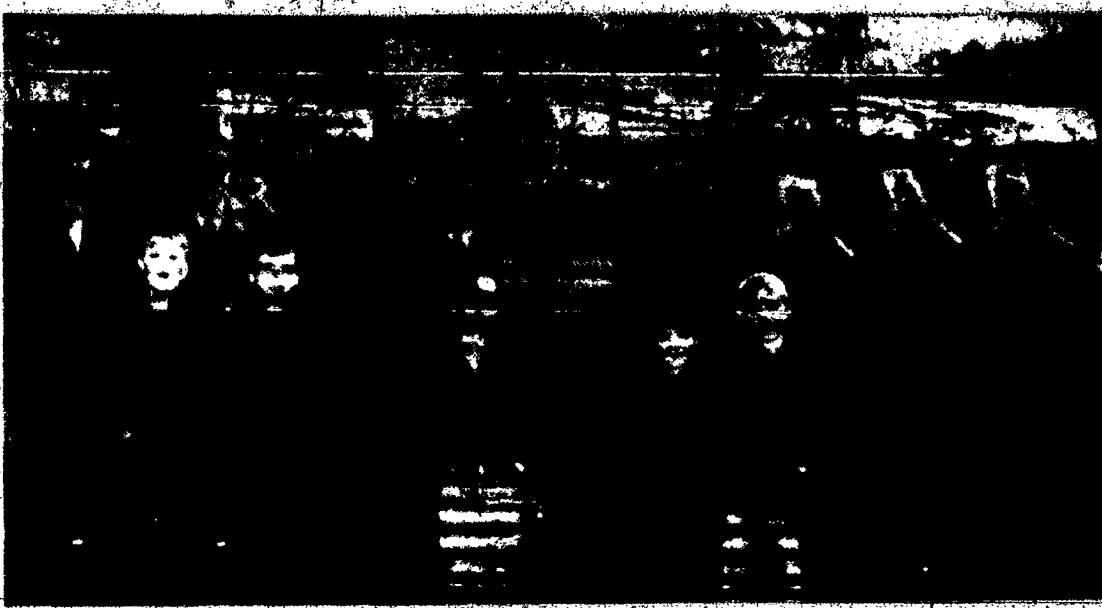
The Rev. Gennaro Ventura, pastor, extended his thanks and praise of the work accomplished during Father Morgan's stay.

## Groundbreaking Rites Held In Fairport For New School Of Religious Education

With breaking of ground for its School of Religious Education, Sunday afternoon, March 4, Assumption Parish in Fairport became the focal point of national as well as local interest, according to the Rev. Leonard A. Kelly, pastor.

The reason is that the institution—which will be completed by September—aims to be the most modern and complete facility of its kind in the nation. As the latest example of a new concept in religious education—the "Catechetical Center"—it will be studied by public as well as parochial school superintendents throughout the country.

The Rev. Albert H. Schnacky, Diocesan Director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine said in connection with the ceremony that, "the new building represents the latest answer to the problems presented to the religious educator by rapidly mushrooming suburban communities."

"TWO MAJOR factors," he said, "are necessary for the success of such an undertaking. The first is the cooperation of local public school officials in releasing pupils for religious education; at convenient periods."

"The second is the development of a religious Order of women specifically for this task. The Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, who will staff the school, were founded in 1890 in Baltimore. His presence to conduct formal classes of religious instruction for children of public grade and high schools, to train lay catechists, and to do religious social work. Fairport is fortunate in obtaining their expert services."

Father Kelly said that the Catechetical Center fits in with the need expressed last week by the American Association of School Administrators. He cited that at their annual convention in Atlantic City, 19,000 public educators declared in a resolution, "The teaching of moral and spiritual values in public schools is indispensable to the perpetuation of the American way of life. We urge the continued and increased cooperation of the schools with other community agencies which strive to make youth sensitive to the value of wholesome living."

Present at the ceremony were: Father Schnacky, Father Kelly and his assistant the Rev. Vin-

cent Collins; parish trustees, Dr. James W. Welch and Peter Doyle; four Sisters representing the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, Frank Brokaw, superintendent of the Fairport School System, children and people of the Assumption Parish.

The Feast of St. Patrick will open with Solemn Pontifical Mass to be celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney in the patronal church, St. Patrick's, Plymouth Ave. North and Brown at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 17.

Bishop Kearney will preach the traditional panegyric. Assisting Bishop Kearney in the Mass will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James C. McAniff, P.A., V.G., Assisting Priest; the Rev. George A. Cocuzzi, Deacon; the Rev. Michael J. Fydlings, Subdeacon; the Rev. Michael P. O'Brien and the Rev. Ernest P. Magee, C.S.B., Deacons of Honor and the Rev. Edward J. McAniff, Master of Ceremonies.
