Baltimore — (NC) — The international headquarters office of the Order of the Alhambra, Catholic fraternal organization, was dedicated here in Baltimore.

It was a case of an organization devoted to creating monuments and markets commemorating important events, places and personages in Catholic history on the North American continent setting up its central base of operations in the "Monumental City" as Baltimore has been called.

The building was blessed and dedicated by the Rev. James V. Ennis of North Evans, supreme chaplain who was assisted by the Rev. John A. Tibull, C.S.S.R., chaplain of the Baltimore unit of the organization, Alexis Caravan.

HARRY J. BROGAN of Baltimore supreme commander in a brief dedication address said that last year the organization celebrated its golden anniversary. He added "As you know growth and progress has been slow, very slow in fact when compared to the rapid construction of this new building. However our future is bright and our spirit and morale high."

FORMOSA-BOUND MISSIONER Courier Plea Receives Wide Diocesan Response

A plea from a Formosa-bound missioner published in the March 2 issue of the Catholic Courier Journal has met with overwhelming results according to the Rev. Patrick Veil, S.M.B.

Father Veil, who was visiting for a few weeks with his brother, Michael Veil, 70 Vayo St., Rochester, made a request for religious articles and pictures to take with him to the Orient.

He explained that these articles of piety are of great influence in winning friendship and trust of the Formosa natives, who are aboriginals. He therefore has asked that his "heartfelt thanks and promise of prayers for the people of the Rochester Diocese" be published in the Catholic Courier Journal.

RESPONSE CAME from all over the Rochester diocese and in such abundance that the missioner finds it impossible to thank personally all those who contributed in the work of his new assignment.

Victor of 20 years mission work in Manchuria, Father Veil was arrested by the Chinese Reds and withstood 3 years of imprisonment and torture before he was exiled in 1949.

He is presently at the American house of the Bethlehem Fathers in Denver, Colo. On March 31 he will sail from San Francisco to the Formosa mission.

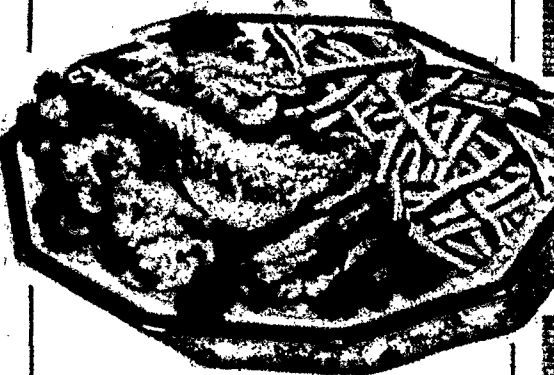

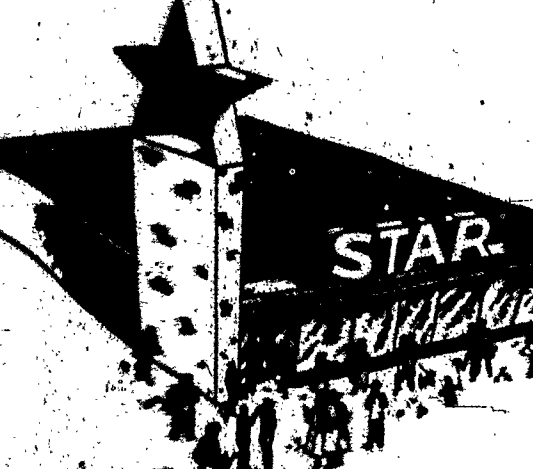
