

Mt. Saviour Prior Tells Of New Holy Week Liturgy

Highlight in the new liturgy for Holy Week were discussed by the Very Rev. Damasus Winzen, prior of Mount Saviour Monastery, at the final Lenten conference of the St. Scholastica League, Sunday, March 18 in the Catholic Daughters' rooms.

Father Damasus stressed that these changes are in the nature of a public manifestation of faith in Divine Charity, exemplifying both the outward and inner significance of Holy Week. "This is particularly evident in the Palm Sunday procession, which symbolizes each individual's role as a branch of the Tree of Redemption."

"THE WASHING of the feet on Holy Thursday shows the priest as the servant of God and man, communicating to his people the depths of God's infinite love. This Divine love reaches an apex on Good Friday. During the three hours commemorating the period Christ hung in agony upon the cross, public adoration is held in the churches, culminating in the Liturgical Action. At this time the people are given the privilege of receiving Holy Communion. The final major change occurs with the Pascal Night ceremonies which end with the Easter Vigil Mass at midnight Holy Saturday. These include the striking of the Easter Fire and lighting and insuring of the Pascal candle and the blessing of baptismal water and

holy oil, all of which were formerly done on Holy Saturday morning."

Father Damasus concluded with the observation that perhaps the most spectacular change is the restoration of the action customary in the early Church days, when congregations, holding lighted candles symbolizing the Risen Saviour, renew aloud their baptismal promises.

Southwark Cathedral Ahead Of Schedule

London — (RNS) — Rebuilding of St. George's Roman Catholic Cathedral Southwark, is expected to be completed before the end of next year instead of 1958 as was originally estimated.

The sum of 50,000 pounds (\$140,000) is being sought to defray the cost of replacing the roof which was completely destroyed when the church was gutted by incendiary bombs during World War II.

Restoration of the bombed edifice was started in 1953. The British governmental War Damage Commission awarded Southwark diocesan officials nearly three-quarters of a million dollars for the reconstruction.

Two years ago Queen Elizabeth and her husband the Duke of Edinburgh, made personal donations to the building fund. It was the first time since the Reformation that a reigning English monarch had subscribed to a Catholic church.
