Convent Drive Set By Parish

Organization of a fund raising campaign for erection of a new convent building for the Sisters of St. Joseph who staff Mother of Sorrow's School, Latta Road, was announced this week by the Rev. Daniel O'Rourke, pastor.

Goal of the drive to replace the present inadequate frame structure is \$200,000 in three-year pledges, the pastor said.

ROBERT WEGMAN, prominent Rochester businessman, has accepted the chairmanship of the campaign committee. He will be assisted by David Andrews, William Bell, Arthur Koerner and Leo Sawko as general coordinators.

Setting of the special gifts committee will be Frederick Messner and Frederick McCormick, co-chairmen. The advisory committee is under the leadership of Joseph Drescher, chairman and Raymond Newstead, co-chairman.

Campaign plans call for organization of the parish into 16 divisions for whom leaders already have been selected. Division leaders presently are campaign team captains. Assistance in direction of the drive is being given by the Rev. Bruce Ammering, pastor.

College Forum Speakers Heard
Nazareth College Alumnae Association annual forum was held in the Nazareth College auditorium Wednesday, March 22.

Mrs. Ann Lane presided. The topic discussed was "The overprivileged child, an asset or threat to society." Speakers were Miss Catherine Sullivan, vice principal of Benjamin Franklin High School; Miss Margaret Smith, chief psychiatric social worker at Rochester Guidance Center; John J. Conway, Jr., assistant district attorney; and the Rev. Eugene McFarland, director of the Catholic Youth Organization.

Miss Sullivan discussed the intellectually gifted child and how the schools are fulfilling this type of child's special requirements. Miss Smith told her everyday experiences with the emotional problems of overprivileged youngsters. Conway emphasized the over indulged child and the social consequences of this type of overprotection. Father McFarland dealt with the spiritual aspects of this same problem.

This was the second of the association's annual forum on problems of today's children.

Monsignor Mahoney Extols Irish Faith At KC Dinner

Corning—An audience of about 125 heard Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney explain that the fire of faith, started by St. Patrick in Ireland, will burn forever, when he spoke at the annual St. Patrick's Day dinner of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, at the local KC Home last Saturday evening.

The dinner served as a homecoming for Monsignor Mahoney, a native of this city and a graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School and the Corning Free Academy. Last Sunday, ground was tumbled broken for the church of his new parish of Christ the King in Irondequoit. He studied for the priesthood at Catholic University and for several years was a director of education in the Diocese of Rochester.

Entertainment for the dinner was provided by Mrs. Philip Grampp, soprano, who sang "Macushla" and "Rose of Tralee," accompanied by Mrs. Thomas II Ward and Albert (Barby) Howard, singer and banjoist from Cortland State Teachers' College who is doing field work at the Youth Center Howard was accompanied by Albert (Pete) Kershner who also played for group singing, led by George E. Oliver.

DR. HUGH T. KEENAN, toast master introduced the Rev. Ralph Thomas SA, chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, who gave the invocation and benediction. Dr. Keenan also introduced Michael McMahon, a member of Corning Council since 1900, and William F. Cumiskey, a member since 1906.

Others introduced were Grand Knight Thomas E. Kelley who gave the address of welcome; Police Chief and Mrs. Roman J. Laurence, deputy grand knight and Mrs. Charles W. Heston and Joseph E. Hayes, dinner chairman.

"What is a storm when there is sunshine and light in the eyes and hearts of the Irish?" asked Msgr. Mahoney in opening his talk.

He said that loyalty, perseverance, sensitiveness and well-exercised temper are characteristic of the Irish.

"THIS DAY," he said, "is one of sentimentality when the whole world pays tribute to the apostle of Ireland more than 1,600 years after his death. St. Patrick is, and always will be, the great saint, because we remember man for their ideals and heroism and for what they contribute to world culture."

"St. Patrick," Msgr. Mahoney said, "heard the call of God through the voice of the Irish. He converted an entire nation
