Court Upholds Censor Ban On Movie

Chicago — (NC) — With a ruling that Chicago motion picture censorship is constitutional, Federal Judge J. Samuel Perry upheld a Police Department censor ban against the showing of "The Game of Love" motion picture here.

THE FRENCH-MADE movie has been evaluated in Class C—wholly objectionable for all—by the National Legion of Decency. The film has been distributed in this country by Time Films Corporation, attorneys for which have indicated that they will appeal from Judge Perry's ruling.

In his decision, Judge Perry reversed the findings of Master in Chancery David J. Siftman, who conducted a preliminary hearing of the case that the terms "obscene" and "immoral" in the Chicago censorship statute are too vague to be enforced.

THERE WAS A special showing of the film for a jury in the case. The jury by a vote of 11 to 1 found the film obscene. But Judge Perry said he disregarded the jury vote and expressed his own views in rendering the decision.

Judge Perry held that the film is obscene within the definitions of the U.S. Supreme Court. He cited several of the highest tribunal's decisions, holding that free speech is not abridged by censorship of films before they are exhibited.

Barry Day Urged In Congress Bill

Washington — (NC) — Rep. William A. Barrett of Pennsylvania has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives that would make September 13 a legal public holiday in honor of Commodore John Barry, who was issued the first commission in the U. S. Navy by George Washington and is called "The Father of the American Navy." The holiday would be known as "Barry Day."

No Students Will Stand In Corner

Chicago — (NC) — No student will ever have to stand in the corner if he attends class in the addition being built on St. Patrick's High School here.

As a matter of fact, no one would be able to stand in a corner if they wanted to. The new building is round, the first such school building to be built in Chicago proper.

Scheduled to open next fall, the building, designed to house 480 students in maximum classroom area with minimum wall space.

as a challenge and warning to me. Even in His death I could almost hear Christ speaking to me: "Caiphias, you have put me to death but I will be back. I will rise on the third day."

To allay my mounting fears, I arranged to have the Tomb sealed and for soldiers to guard it. Then I went home to wait for the third day.

The last night I did not sleep very well. When the frightened soldiers rushed to my palace early on Sunday morning I was awake and waiting for them, almost as if I expected them.

"He is risen!" the soldiers cried. Their message staggered me. Christ was back! I was not rid of Him and I knew that I would never be rid of Him.

I pretended not to believe the guards. But in my heart I knew the truth—Christ had risen as He said!

MARY MAGDALEN — Writers call me the chief character in the first act of the Resurrection drama. No doubt this is because I was one of the little group of women who first discovered the Empty Tomb on the morning of the third day after Christ's death.

Although we did not understand it, we women stumbled on the mystery of the Resurrection even before the Apostles. Even before Peter and John.

As a woman, I am always proud that we were the first of Christ's followers to be on the scene the morning He arose from the dead.

None of us, who followed Christ; expected the surprising and swift turn of events that took place on that morning of the third day.

When He was alive, Our Lord told us that He would be put to death and rise again on the third day. But we forgot Christ's promise when we saw Him die on the cross and His body laid away in the Tomb.

Anything like a resurrection from the dead was incredible to all of us who mourned for Christ. We could not imagine any such thing. We were inconsolable. The third day after the Master's death found us a sorry, desperate lot. We had no hope, only memories.

Even our memories were short. I forgot the day that the Lord raised my brother Lazarus from the grave. That was the day I heard the Master assure us with those wonderful words: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. He that believeth in Me, although he be dead, shall live!"

Early on the morning of the third day, before day break, I gathered a few of the women together and set out for the Tomb where Christ was buried. We carried spices

and ointments and linen. Christ's burial late on Friday had been rushed and now we wanted to prepare the Master's body more properly.

As we entered the garden a great tremor shook the area. Then we turned a corner in the garden and we could see the Tomb. It was open. The great slab of stone which had sealed it was flat on the ground. The soldiers who guarded the Tomb lay prostrate on the ground as if stunned. The Tomb was empty.

I could think of only one thing. Somebody had stolen the Lord's body. I thought of the Apostles. They must be told. I left my friends at the Tomb and hurried into the City. Peter and the Apostles, a grim group, were gathered in the Upper Room. Feeling anger as well as sorrow, I broke in upon them with my announcement: "They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid him."

The Apostles stared at me. I was speaking idle tales to them. When I insisted that the Tomb was empty, Peter signalled John and both of them started for the Tomb. I followed after them but they ran on ahead of me.

When again I reached the garden, I walked slowly and began to weep as I recalled all the terrible suffering and death of the Lord. And now this final indignity, His body stolen and carried off by his enemies.

Through my tears I noticed the figure of a man standing in my path. The gardener, I thought. Then He spoke to me. "Woman, why weepest thou? Whom seekest thou?"

I hardly looked at Him. Maybe he knows something about the Lord. I spoke to Him. "Sir," I said, "if thou has taken Him hence, tell me where thou has laid Him and I will take Him away."

In answer, He spoke my name. "Mary!" he said. In amazement I look up through my tears. Then came recognition. "Master!" I cried and fell at His feet. It was the Lord! The Lord was back. He was risen. He had a message for me. "Go to my brethren," He said, "and say to them: I ascend to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God."

My heart beat with a new joy as I raced back to the City with my message for the Apostles. I, Mary Magdalen, converted from a life of sin and forgiven by Christ, was now the official messenger of His Resurrection. Proudly, I delivered my message to the Apostles.

"I have seen the Lord," I told them, "and these things He said to me..." They did not believe me. I was only an excited woman to them. But I knew the secret of the Resurrection. The Lord was risen!
