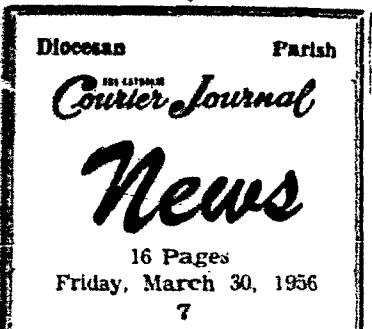

Ordained in 1938, Monsignor Sullivan served as an assistant at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Rochester and as a chaplain with the United States Armed Forces overseas prior to taking a post as NCWC News Service correspondent in Vatican City.

FOR MORE THAN FIVE YEARS Monsignor Sullivan handled the news out of Vatican City for the Catholic news service in the United States. He was made a papal chamberlain with the title of Very Reverend Monsignor by Pope Pius XII in January, 1953.

## New Easter Vigil Rites Scheduled With Midnight Mass In All Churches

For the first time all churches of the Rochester Diocese will climax observance of Lent this year with impressive Easter Vigil rites scheduled for late Holy Saturday night.

Mass at midnight in honor of the Resurrection of our Lord will conclude the Easter Vigil ceremonies.

Striking feature of the Easter Vigil will be the renewal of baptismal vows by congregations in candle-lighted churches.

The Holy Saturday ceremonies previously observed in most parishes on Saturday morning, this year will be held in the evening beginning at 10:30 or 11 p.m. as scheduled by individual pastors.

CONGREGATIONS WILL be urged to sing the responses and other chants of the Vigil service and Mass in accord with the recently revised directions for Holy Week ceremonies.

The hour long rites preceding the midnight Mass will include blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, symbols of Christ rising from the dead. Water will be blessed for use at baptisms and the litany of the saints will be chanted.

All ceremonies are to be conducted in such a way that the people will see and understand them.

Many pastors have arranged to have a priest in the pulpit explain the rites while another priest conducts the ceremony in the sanctuary.

HOLY SATURDAY will be marked as a day of fast and abstinence until midnight. Previously the Lenten restrictions ended at noon.

Bishop Kearney has granted a dispensation allowing meat to be eaten once on Holy Saturday. There will be no church services on Holy Saturday morning.

Confessions will be heard at the usual hours on Saturday afternoon and evening in preparation for Easter Communion.

Catholics wishing to receive Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil are required to fast only from midnight if the Mass begins at or after midnight. In parishes where the Mass may be scheduled earlier, a fast of three hours from solid food and a one hour fast from liquids is required for Communion.
