## Assumption Gets University Status

Windsor, Ont. — (NC) — Western Ontario's oldest institution of higher learning, Assumption College, has been granted the status of a university.

The new title, Assumption University of Windsor, was made possible by the recent affiliation of Essex College and Holy Redeemer College and Assumption College, which is 99 years old. The legislature of the Province of Ontario granted the highest status in legislation which became effective on March 28.

**THE UNIVERSITY** is a residential school, conducted by the Basilian Fathers. The university college of Arts is a constituent of Essex College in a non-sectarian college of science. Holy Redeemer College is a Redemptorist seminary that is now under construction. The third affiliate is Holy Names College, a women's institution which has been associated with Assumption for 22 years.

The university is under the direction of the Basilian Fathers who also conduct St. John Fisher College and Aquinas Institute, Rochester.

## Corpus Christi Campaign Tops Goal With \$266,135

A total of \$266,135 in three car pledges — \$91,000 over the goal — was obtained in a two-hour canvass in Corpus Christi parish on Sunday, March 26, it was reported this week by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, parish administrator.

More than 400 men conducted the parishwide solicitation for funds for renovation of parish properties and installation of a parking area.

In an expression of thanks to the parishioners and the campaign committee, Monsignor Maney termed the drive results most gratifying, and declared that "I know that God will bless you for the sacrifices you are making for His honor and glory."

RENOVATION plans include major repair of the church school rectory and parish convent. The latter building is at 24 Prince St. adjoining the grounds of the Academy of the Sacred Heart.

Demolition of the St. Agnes Convent School building at 876 Main St. E. between the church and school, also is scheduled. A completely paved 250-car parking lot will be installed on the site extending back to Champeney.
