Ancient Corinth, Rebuked By St. Paul, Now Deserted

By REV. JOSEPH MINIHAN Corinth, Greece (NC) - Ancient Corinth, to which the Apostle Paul addressed two Epistles, is no longer famous as a trading center. Today its inhabitants are few and many of them are archaeologists searching among its ruins. It was in this ancient city that St. Paul wrote his Epistle to the Romans. But the few Christians permanently living here now are members of the schismatic Orthodox Church.

AS THERE is no Catholic chapel in either the ancient or the new city of Corinth, I set up an altar stone in the old city pit on vestments and began Mass. A young woman from the American School of Archaeology answered the prayers of the Mass from the roadside about 50 yards away. Formerly Corinth was a thriving international port city of 200,000 people. Its chief export was the currant crop. The name "currant" is derived from the name of this city. In our time the town of Patras on the coast has taken over the bulk of Corinth's trade and this city is now merely a fifth-rate port.

The land around the city is neglected and economically depressed. With right care and intensive cultivation, the land could be made fruitful. There is plenty of sunshine. ANOTHER PILLAR of former Corinthian prosperity was its military importance. Large garrisons were stationed here under the Romans, the Byzantines, the Venetians and the Turks in succession. Large fortifications remain from these times. The decline of the city began with the emancipation of Greece from Turkish domination in 1832. Corinth is principally known in the popular mind as a cosmopolitan, wide-open town. This reputation goes back to classical times. When St. Paul preached here about the year 55, he took the Christian converts to task for compromising with pagan moral laxities of their townsmen. Corinthians today remember that point in his letter to them. Professor Alivizatos, an Athenian authority on St. Paul, warned me not to speak of Corinthians "as St. Paul's people" - for the Corinthians take this phrase as meaning they have bad morals.

THE PLACE now called Corinth is not on the site of the ancient city. Modern, or new, Corinth stands by the gulf at a point where a magnificent Roman road was built from ancient Corinth to its port. The only thing to recommend the new city is the magnificent view of the cliffs and mountains across the water. In this poverty stricken town of 18,000 there is little business activity. The hurricane of 1928 seems to have fatally damaged business initiative.

The old city of Corinth is about six miles from the present city. The only workers there are the archaeologists who have ranged the best of Corinthian statuary in the halls and arcades of the museum. For many years in the early Christian era there was an Archbishop at Corinth. Some time after the split between the Roman and the Greek Church in 1054, the Archbishopric became a titular See in the Latin Church.

Prelate Asks Profit Share For Workers

Madrid (RNS) - Archbishop Casimiro Morcillo y Gonzalez of Zaragoza issued a pastoral letter stressing the worker's right to a fair share in the profits of industry. Archbishop Morcillo, who is widely known as a scholar and sociologist, asserted that employers have an obligation to make over to their workers a large proportion of their profits. "Having deducted that proportion of the profits which in justice belongs to the State," he said, "we do not hesitate to assert that all the rest belongs to the workers."
