

### Parishes In 5 Counties Adopt Full C-J Coverage

Five counties of the twelve-county Diocese of Rochester have all parishes in their respective areas enrolled in the "full coverage" subscription plan of the Catholic Courier-Journal.

Other counties report as high as 90 per cent of their parishes in the "full coverage" plan. "FULL COVERAGE" means that 80 to 100 per cent of the families of a parish subscribe to the Courier-Journal, official diocesan paper.

Of the 146 parishes in the Diocese, 121 have adopted the "full coverage" program. Cheung, Tioga, Tompkins, Yates and Wayne counties are the five counties with all parishes having "full coverage."

TIOGA-TOMPKINS and Wayne counties also comprise two deanery divisions of the diocese. These are the first deaneries to report all parishes in their areas having the "full coverage" plan. Monsignor John S. Randall, managing editor of the Courier-Journal, has stated that this year's circulation record, high total of over 54,000 is due to the cooperation of the pastors throughout the diocese in promoting the diocesan paper in their parishes.

Geneva A class of 100 candidates named in memory of the late Arthur P. McAvoy of Geneva was received into the Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus in De Sales High School gymnasium Sunday followed by Benediction in St. Stephen Church.

The Very Rev. Msgr. Joseph J. Sullivan, pastor of Holy Cross Church (Ovid) was guest speaker at a banquet following in Club 55. Monsignor Sullivan is a former N.C.W.C. News Service Correspondent serving in Vassar City.

Discussing his eight years of experience with the people of Italy, Monsignor Sullivan remarked:

"The people of the United States wonder why Italy has so many Communists."

He pointed out that there are 68 political parties in Italy, while we have only two in this country. "No wonder," he said, "that the people of Italy are confused."

### GOD LOVE YOU!

When the Son of God became the Son of man in the Person of Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, the scriptures tell us that He "emptied" Himself, or "dispossessed" Himself and "took the nature of a slave, fashioned in the likeness of man, in presenting Himself to us in human form." This does not mean that He emptied Himself of His Divinity, but rather of the glory attaching itself to Divinity. You would regard it as a great humiliation to divest yourself of your human glory, and put your soul into the body of an animal; this would subject you to all of the limitations of an animal organism, as well as association with other animals. But this is nothing compared to the humiliation of God becoming man, subjecting Himself to sufferings, incidental to a human body, and companionship with ignorant fishermen.

The one role that Our Blessed Lord as always fulfilling in His emptying was that of a servant. That was why the night of the Last Supper He guided Himself with a towel, as He washed the feet of His disciples.

If we are to work worthy of Christ, we too must learn to empty ourselves, to dispossess our ego and the claim of the world upon us. One way to do this is to take on a form of a servant of the Missions; to send a sacrifice to the Holy Father, who will use it to make Redemption known in Japan, Korea, Vietnam, India and other parts of the world. The servant who bears a heavy physical burden makes it possible for others to enjoy a greater freedom for the extension of this soul. If Our Lord exchanged "the form of God" for the form of a servant, then shall you not exchange the form of one who has a few superfluous earthly glories for the form of the servant of the poor of the world in Christ's name? Whatever sacrifice you send us, will be sent directly to the Holy Father who makes the distribution — for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith is his society for all the Missions of the world.
