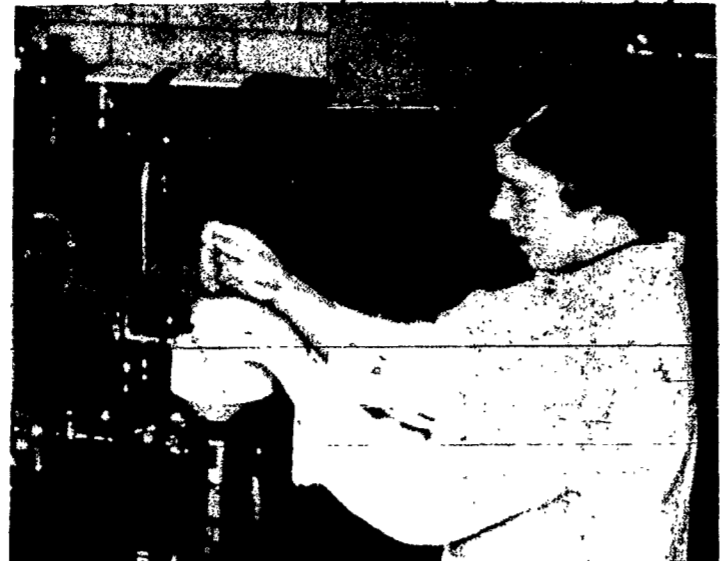

They plan to study for their doctorate. Both young women received honorable mention in the 1956 National Science Foundation Graduate Scholarship competition.
 MISS MCGOWAN is the daughter of Mrs. Martha McGowan 20 Whitmore St., Rochester. She attended St. Boniface parochial school and Monroe High School and was the winner of a number of college scholarships, including New York State Knights of Columbus Children of Deceased War Veterans, and a Nazareth College competitive scholarship. At Monroe High School she was a member of the National Honor Society and the Sports Editor of the Yearbook. In college she has been an active member and treasurer of the International Relations Club, a member of the Chemistry Club, and a member of the "Sigillum" staff. She has continued her active interest in athletics and sports at Nazareth.
 MISS FRISCH is the daughter of the late Mrs. Lillian Frisch, 38 Harris St., Rochester. She is graduate of St. Michael's grade school and Our Lady of Mercy High School. She also was a member of the National Honor Society and was the editor-in-chief of the Quill, the school paper.
 At Nazareth College she was a member of the Chemistry Club, the Yearbook staff and an active member of the Athletic Association and basketball chairman. During the past summer she worked on a research project at the Atomic Energy project.
 Both young women are student affiliates of the American Chemical Society and members of the Rochester Academy of Science. Miss Frisch is the secretary-treasurer of the Astronomical section of the latter organization.

CRITICS AND KINDNESS

There used to be an old joke which went something like this: "Mary Jane has such an even disposition" and then the response to the query, "Is that so?" was "Yes, she is always dissatisfied." I think of that every so often in my dealings with individuals in organizations.
 Take for example, the lady who never approves of an idea unless Minerva-like, it springs full blown from her own cerebra. This dissatisfied worker can be best described by saying that if on Saturday morning someone should say to her "Tomorrow is Sunday", she would answer, "When was this decided? Who said it was?" And then if it were made clear to her that Sunday always follows Saturday, she would expostulate, "But isn't this terribly short notice?"
 I suppose a psychiatrist could give us a learned explanation and lengthy name for this aberration; but for the people who have to deal with the unfurling of the names are unimportant; the problem is to deal in a tactful and Christian manner that is best for the organization.
 I used to think that such a member should be placated or at least measures should be taken to correct the situations and decisions she criticizes. I am not sure this is the best situation. Perhaps a good firm straight forward reply given, and this is the most difficult part with dignity and Christian charity might bring her to see the error of her ways.
 THE EVER present tendency on the part of some of the best workers and most interested members to complain and criticize is a very strong reason for regular days of recollection. Every organization should set aside a day, or part of a day, in which the spiritual growth and each member is given a fresh opportunity to re-dedicate herself to the first work of the organization. This, in the case of every Catholic organization, should be working for the greater glory of God in what ever apostolate has been chosen. That God is not glorified by constant bickering of women is a statement that bears repetition.
