Thomas Flynn Rites Conducted

Addison — The funeral of Thomas Flynn, 71, of Buffalo, native and former resident of Addison, was held Thursday, April 19, at the Church of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Buffalo, with High Mass of Requiem being celebrated by the pastor, Monsignor O'Brien with four other priests assisting in the sanctuary.

Following the Requiem Mass, the body was brought to Addison for interment in the Flynn family plot in St. Catherine Cemetery, with the Rev. Francis H. Turner, pastor of St. Catherine Church in the village officiating at the grave.

Mr. Flynn died in Buffalo General Hospital the previous Monday evening following an extended illness.

For several years he was employed in the offices of the Erie Railroad in Elmira and Hornell and later embarked on a career of his own as a public accountant in Buffalo where he has resided for the past 35 years. In 1908 he was married to the former Susan Doherty of Hornell in St. Ann Church, in Hornell, after which they lived for a few years in Hammondsport and then moved to Buffalo.

Mr. Flynn was a member of St. Catherine Church in Addison during his boyhood days and he was a member of the Church of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Buffalo and of its Holy Name Society of the Buffalo Council of the Knights of Columbus. Mr. Flynn retired from his public accountant business two years ago.
