**Catholic Scout  
Growth Seen Rapid**

Kansas City, Mo. (RNS)—There are more than 525,000 Catholic youngsters enrolled in some 9,000 Catholic Boy Scout and Cub Scout units in the U.S. and its possessions, the Rev. Gregory L. Mooney, Scout chaplain of the New York Archdiocese, reported here.  
He told the 14th national conference of Diocesan Scout Chaplains that prior to 1934 there were only about 1,000 Catholic Boy Scout groups in the entire country. Nearly one-half of the 16,000 parishes of the nation now have at least one such unit, the priest said.  
The percentage of gain in membership of Scouts enrolled in units under Catholic Church auspices has been higher in the last 20 years than at any time in the movement's history. Father Mooney said. He said it was slightly higher than the percentage rise for the Boy Scout organization as a whole.
