Wawbeek Hotel On Saranac Lake Purchased By Rochester Couple

Wawbeek Hotel on Upper Saranac Lake has been acquired by Mr. and Mrs. Harry Purchase of Rochester, according to word received here.

For the last four years the couple has operated the hotel, located on a 24 acre site six miles north of Tupper Lake in the Adirondack Mountains, under a lease agreement.

The sellers were Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Charest of Russell, Mass.

In addition to a general upgrading of the buildings and rooms, a new beach, picnic area and driveway are planned.

THE WAWBEEK HOTEL, with accommodations for 70 guests, is a landmark in Northern New York State, and familiar to hundreds of vacationers from throughout the Eastern United States.

The first hotel, built in 1891, was one of the three original summer resorts in the Adirondacks. The present building is the third to be built on the property and is one of the newest of the resort hotels. Although rustic in appearance, featured by beamed ceilings and natural wood exterior, it is of very modern design. Each room of suite has a private bath, and most have telephones.

In addition to the hotel proper, there are three cottages on the property.

Because of its location on beautiful Upper Saranac Lake, recognized as one of the most picturesque and majestic of the Adirondack lakes, the resort is a favorite vacation spot for fishermen, golfers, and water-sport enthusiasts. The crystal clear lake is perfect for swimming, boating and water skiing. It also abounds in lake trout and large mouth bass. The hotel's dining room is famous for serving the fresh-caught fish brought in by guests.

Two championship 18-hole golf courses are nearby. The Tupper Lake Country Club and the Saranac Inn golf course offer the finest golf in the Adirondacks.

The new owners of Wawbeek are better well known in the hotel field. Before leasing Wawbeek four years ago they operated the Island Cottage Hotel in Rochester.
