### Women's Place In World Outlined At Corning

Corning—Speaking on the theme, "Catholic Woman's Place in the World Today," the Rev. Leo McMannus of Rochester used Pope Pius XII's charge to women in emphasizing the "dignity which women have as women" as speaker at the annual tea of Corning District Council, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, Sunday afternoon.

Father McMannus, a professor of English and Homiletics at St. Bernard Seminary and diocesan moderator for the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, stressed the Pope's charge to women to cooperate in a womanly way with man in helping solve some of the social problems of today.

"All individuals," the priest explained, "have a dignity as children of God. Women, as women, have a dignity because God has bestowed on them peculiar characteristics designed to safeguard and nourish domestic life.

"They as women," he continued, "are peculiarly sensitive to the forces which would attack their God-given dignity, the happiness of family life and life itself."

"Paradoxically, perhaps, in preserving their own womanly virtues, they will best preserve their equality with men and best contribute to the solution of today's problems."

SOME 200 Catholic women attended the afternoon tea in the corner Miss Sophie Cuzio's of Rochester, diocesan president, and members of her Flower Club staff who accompanied Father McMannus to Corning for the affair.

Father McMannus was introduced by the Rev. James Slattery, assistant pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Church and local moderator. Mrs. Philip Gramann, Corning president, presided for the program and gave the address of welcome.

The program was presented in a piece of St. Stephen crystal by Mrs. William McCarthy, co-chairman of arrangements on behalf of the local council.

### Editor To Speak At St. Bonaventure

St. Bonaventure, N. Y. — Richard Reid, Vice-President and Editor of the New York Catholic News, will be the principal speaker at the 25th Commencement of St. Bonaventure University on Sunday, June 3, it was announced today by the Very Rev. Brian Lhota, OFM, President.

In addition to delivering the address, Father Lhota said, Reid will also receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters from the University.

Reid, a native of Winchester, Mass., has combined newspaper, law, and teaching careers.

Reid received his law degree from Fordham University and was admitted to the Bar in Georgia in 1929 where he practiced until 1940. For three years during this period, 1937-40, Reid was a past lecturer at the University of Notre Dame.

Reid joined the New York Catholic News as editor in 1940. He is a trustee of the American Catholic Historical Society and a past president of the Catholic Press Association. He is a Knight of St. Gregory and Knight of the Holy Sepulchre. In 1946, he was presented the Holy Medal for Inter-racial Justice and received the Laetare Medal from the University of Notre Dame in 1956.
