

Graduation Set Tonight For Kindergarteners

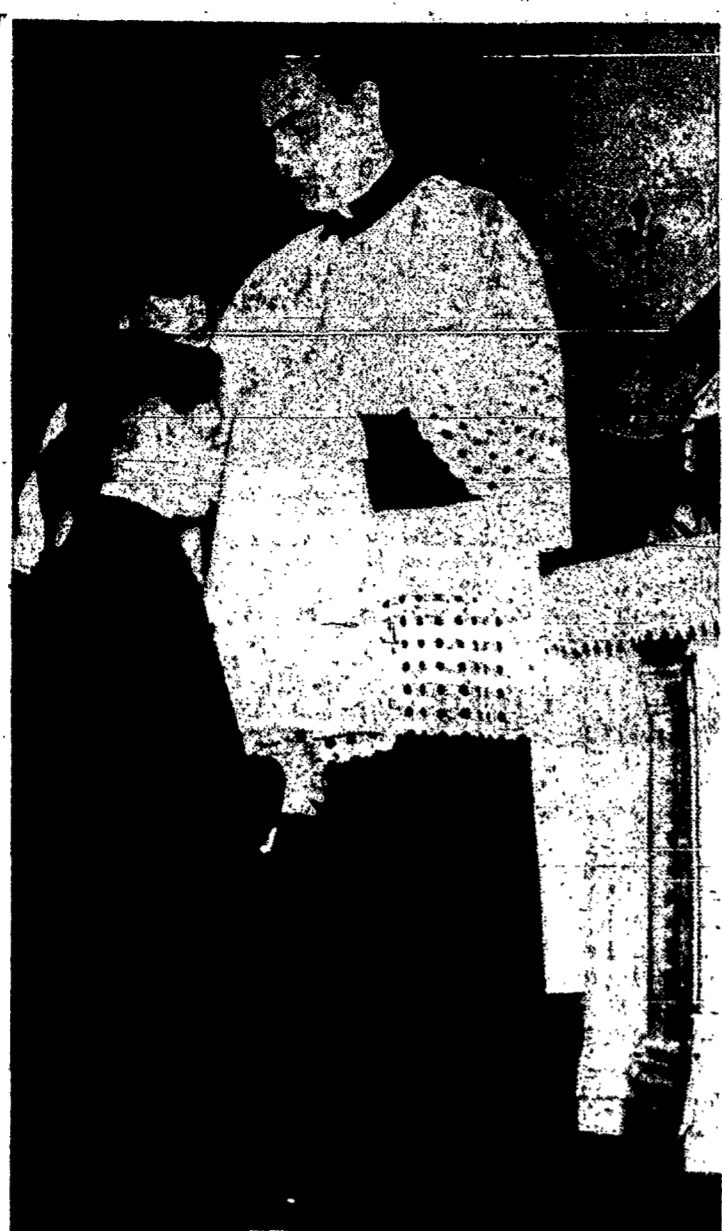

Ithaca Knights Of Altar Investiture Ceremony Held

Ithaca—Altar boys of Immaculate Conception Parish, Ithaca, were invested in the Knights of the Altar at ceremonies last Sunday in the church. The Rev. Otto J. Vogt, assistant pastor is director of the altar boys.

The Knights of the Altar is a society for altar boys established in 1932 in which the boys achieve various ranks from apprentice through page, knight, knight commander, and grand knight, and a supreme grand knight is elected from among the grand knights.

The ten boys with the rank of grand knight took part in the investiture ceremony on Sunday and represented the other altar boys. This ceremony took place after the reading of the Gospel in the Mass.

Father Vogt from the pulpit read the names of all the altar boys and the ranks they had achieved. Then the ten grand knights, who were kneeling at the sanctuary, knelt in a row and were vested with their cassocks by Father Vogt saying: "Receive this cassock with greatest respect for it is part of the armor you shall wear as a knight in the service of your Lord and Master Jesus Christ."

The boys then advanced toward the altar two by two and the priest vested them in their surplices saying: "Receive this surplice and may its whiteness ever be a true symbol of the gleaming purity of your soul." All the altar boys, after this part of the ceremony, recited the pledge of the Knights of the Altar: "We, the Knights of the Altar, pledge allegiance to Our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, to His Vicar and other representatives on earth, and to Mary our Queen Immaculate, whom we will serve faithfully until we attain eternal triumph in heaven. Equally sincere, we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, loyalty to the country over which it waves, obedience to authority and to the Constitution, upholding liberty, religious freedom and equality for all."

After the recitation of the pledge, the other altar boys came from their pews row by row to the Communion rail and certificates were given to all members, and after receiving them the boys recited aloud: "I promise to observe faithfully the rules of the Knights of the Altar and to be a loyal Knight at all times."

Next, pins were bestowed on the boys for the ranks they had achieved, by the priest saying: "Receive this pin as the emblem of the rank you have attained in the Knights of the Altar. May you always be faithful to your duties."
