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Cardinal Tien, Bishop Casey Congratulate Msgr. Randall

A Cardinal and a Bishop led clergy and laity in honoring the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall as he marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination Sunday at Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester.

His Eminence, Thomas Cardinal Tien, exiled Archbishop of Peking, China, presided at the Solemn Jubilee Mass and thanked the jubilant for missionary aid sent from the Rochester Diocese to the Church in China.

Monsignor Randall, pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church, is diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. He is also managing editor of the Courier-Journal. His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey delivered the jubilee sermon. He described the work of a Catholic priest and pointed out how Monsignor Randall had served this role for "twenty-five silver years."

"BISHOP CASEY'S sermon in part continued: "As Monsignor Randall celebrates his Silver Jubilee today, he can look back on 25 fruitful and happy years as a priest of God. After a long friendship, I know him well enough to be certain that he would want his jubilee to be fundamentally a tribute to the holy priesthood, and not to himself personally."

"This is the typical reaction of the good priest as he surveys 25 silver years in the service of the Lord. As he reaches the 25-year mark, his one thought is of humble gratitude for the many blessings he has received, for the privilege of just being able to work for the Lord.

"A SIGNIFICANT feature of this celebration is the number has affected and who are absent from the scene today—25 of those whose lives his work touched scattered around the diocese, or around the globe, or those now with God, for whom Monsignor Randall offered Mass; those whom he baptized, the children he prepared for their First Confession and Communion, the thousands to whom he has acted as father and physician in the dark recesses

of the confessional, the thousands to whom he has given the Bread of Life, as food for their souls, the number of sick to whom he has given strength and consolation, those whom he has prepared for death in the course of the years.

"Most significant of all are the hundreds of missionary priests and nuns whom he has helped through his work as Diocesan Director of the Propagation of the Faith. When we consider that these missionaries have in their turn brought tens of thousands of converts to the Faith, we can begin to appreciate the value of Monsignor's consecrated work. Most of these we have mentioned are not here today but they too can say a prayer of gratitude for a good priest who helped them when they really needed it.

"If I may be permitted a personal word this morning, I have known the Jubilarian for 36 years. We were schoolmates together for most of our secondary course. After ordination, our work brought us together frequently and I have come to know him well. What judgment can we make on an occasion like this? I think it could spring from a rather cryptic sentence of Our Lord: "He who loses his life for my sake, shall find it." Math. 10, 39.

"LIKE THE REST of his friends and associates, I have never ceased to admire—and envy, Monsignor's inexhaustible supply of energy in working for the Church and the good of souls. Handicapped by indifferent health during the early part of his priesthood, he did not worry about himself or slacken his efforts. He kept on going and got the work done. "He who loses his life for my sake, shall find it. That's been the story of 25 years—not thinking of himself and getting the work done.

"That work would ordinarily

have taken several individuals to accomplish. As you know, Monsignor is a man of many parts. He has not only raised several millions of dollars for the most vital work of the Church, the missions, but more important, he has made the children and the adults of the diocese mission-conscious. As an example, no one can begin to estimate the effects of the great Mission Scenerama last Fall, particularly in recruiting religious vocations. The major part of the credit for this project belongs to our Jubilarian. He had the vision to conceive the idea and the courage to bring it into reality in spite of many obstacles.

"IN THE FIELD of Catholic Journalism, he has done outstanding work. Under his capable direction, the Catholic Courier-Journal has trebled in circulation and made a steady advance in the quality of its contents until it is now recognized as one of the major Catholic newspapers in the country. His interests in this field have not been confined to Rochester. He has worked for the advancement of the Catholic Press on a national scale and his recent election as President of the National Catholic Press Association has brought prestige to his native diocese.

"It is a matter of general knowledge also that Monsignor Randall has done much for the cause of education in the di-

ocese. Under the direction of Bishop Kearney, he was the mainspring in the organization of several campaigns to build Catholic colleges and high schools. The Lord has gifted him with a mastery of detail, a flair for organization, and every drive with which he has been associated was most successful.

"SO FAR AS Monsignor Randall is concerned, I doubt that he would have wanted me to indulge in this litany of praise for the work he has done in the priesthood. After a quarter of a century in the Lord's service, he is a realist with few illusions left about the ultimate importance of human praise or honors. As one grows older and draws closer to eternity, these count less and less.

"But I am glad to have had the opportunity this morning to mention publicly the debt that this diocese in particular and the missions of the Church in general owe to him. He has been true to his vocation. He was ordained to help spread the kingdom of Christ, and that he has done with single-minded fidelity.

"And so, as we take part in his Jubilee Mass today, let all of us here ask the Holy High Priest and His Mother to continue to watch over this priest and guide him during the years to come. Ad multos annos, Monsignor Randall."

Springs on doors lose their pull after a time; the jewels that sparkled so brightly when received, begins to peel; the honeymoon settles down to the realities of life; the voyagers are ardently averted turns into a yearning to "get back home." Life is full of a loss by friction—even religious fervor can lose its fire. This is what was behind the complaint of the bridesmaids in the parable told by Our Lord: "Our lamps have gone out." Once they burned brightly; then they flickered and died.

All spiritual emotions and high resolves die unless nourished. We often wonder what happened to our early zeal and piety, why we do not pray as we once did. One day, like the startled bridesmaids, we wake up and see smoking wicks instead of brilliant flames.

The extinction is brought about by doing nothing—just sleeping—like the bridesmaids. Most lives are not shipwrecked through wickedness; it is rather that our souls gather green scum because they are not stirred by sacrifice. Love of friend and neighbor and God—all love dies unless it is lifted to a higher degree by some little denial of self. Otherwise our soul can reach a point where, like a paralyzed limb, it feels no pain.

Make a tiny act of self-denial every day, but do it out of love of Our Lord. For example, do not buy a paper, walk instead of taking a bus; refuse a dessert instead of buying even a cheap one. We know a man in St. Louis who always orders the cheapest item on the menu, regardless of what it is, and gives the balance to the Holy Fathers for the missions of the world. At the end of the month send your sacrifices to us and we will send them to the Holy Father. Notice how your feeble wicks begin to blaze with the love of God.
