Final Public View Of New Carmelite Monastery Listed

Rochesterians will get their last look at the cloistered areas of the new Carmelite Monastery in Jefferson Road and their last opportunity to share in the completion of the edifice over the coming weekend.

Because of the turnaway crowds at the new monastery over the last weekend, the doors will be open to the public again on Saturday and Sunday from 2 to 6 p.m. A staff under Theodore J. Houck will be in charge.

This will mark the final chance for a public view of the cloistered areas which will be available only to the Carmelite nuns when they move in toward the end of this month.

MORE THAN 10,000 men, women and children inspected the unique setup last weekend. Many more were unable to gain entrance because of crowds and traffic. To accommodate these people the decision was made to extend the inspection to the coming weekend according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, chaplain at Carmel.

Meanwhile campaign workers in the finishing fund drive for the new monastery came within an eyelash of their \$94,762 goal this week by raising \$90,636. Because of the many contacts still to be made, especially among the men's teams, the drive will continue through Monday, June 11, according to General Chairman William A. Lang.

At Monday's final dinner in the Immaculate Conception Auditorium, Herman G. Hetzler, honorary chairman of the drive, will play host to the division leaders, team captains and workers and members of the special gifts committee.

TWO OF THE three women's divisions and the special gifts committee went over the top at this week's report dinner. Heading the entire campaign army was the division led by Miss Helen L. Costello which reported \$22,787 for 152 percent of quota.

Mrs. Joseph E. Schnorr reported \$20,498 for 137 percent of quota while Mrs. Lewis J. Boyce's division just missed its \$15,000 quota with \$14,254 for 95 percent. Harry B. Crowley, Jr. reported \$5,158 for 34 percent

while George T. White's division had a \$2,757 total for 18 percent of quota. Campaign workers in all the divisions will be active through Monday night soliciting special gifts committee over the pledges.
