Funeral Rites Monday For Bloomfield Pastor

Solemn Funeral Mass for the Rev. George W. Doud, pastor of St. Bridget Church, East Bloomfield, and of St. Joseph Church, West Bloomfield, will be offered Monday, June 18, at 10:30 a.m. in the East Bloomfield Church.

Father Doud, 70, died early Thursday morning, June 14, while on retreat at St. Bernard's Seminary.

Father Doud has served the Bloomfield parishes since 1931. His Excellency, Bishop James E. Keane, will celebrate the funeral Mass.

Assisting Bishop Keane at the funeral rites will be classmates and priest friends of the deceased pastor.

AT MONDAY'S Funeral Mass, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, Chancellor, will be arch-priest. Rev. E. Joseph Esser will be deacon, and Rev. Charles E. Mucka, subdeacon. Deacons of honor will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Ball, V.F.W.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Ball, V.F.W., will give the eulogy. Burial of Father Doud will take place at St. Bridget's Cemetery, East Bloomfield.

BORN IN ST. MARY'S parish, Rochester, one of four children of the late Thomas Doud and Mary Conlin. Father Doud attended Immaculate Conception School, Rochester, and St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries.

He was ordained in 1912 in St. Patrick's Cathedral by the then Rt. Rev. Joseph H. Conroy, D.D., Coadjutor Bishop of Ogdensburg, with Bishop Thomas F. Hickey at the throne.

After two years as assistant at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Father Doud was appointed as assistant pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva, where he had charge of the four-year Latin course in Dolans High School. Subsequently he taught in Rochester Cathedral High School.

In 1922, Father Doud was named pastor of St. James Church, Naples. On June 20, 1931, he was appointed pastor of St. Bridget Church, Bloomfield. He succeeded the Rev. Patrick A. Neville who had been named pastor of St. Rose Church, Lima. He is survived by a brother, William H. Doud of Rochester; a niece, Mrs. Edward J. Crivich of Canandaigua; two granddaughters and a grandnephew.

Congress Vote Approves Pray For Peace Postmark

Washington — (NC) — The Senate has passed and sent to the White House a bill authorizing the Post Office Department to stamp mail with a "Pray for Peace" postmark.

The White House press office said the day after passage that it was uncertain when President Eisenhower will consider the bill.

The measure, which was introduced in the House last year by Rep. Louis C. Rabaut of Michigan, would permit first and second class post offices to have a special canceling stamp or postmark die to imprint the phrase on mail. The measure was earlier adopted by the House.

Rep. Rabaut said here that enactment of the bill into law will mean that "United States mail delivered here and abroad will manifest to the world an exhortation of our great country to people everywhere to raise their minds and hearts to the Supreme Creator of the Universe and pray for peace."

Pope Sends Blessing For Ike's Recovery

Vatican City — (NC) — His Holiness Pope Pius XII has sent a message to President Eisenhower, ill at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, imparting his apostolic blessing and expressing wishes for the president's quick recovery from his operation.

Following two years in parish work, he began graduate studies at Cornell University where he attained his doctorate degree. FATHER QUINN brings eleven years seminary experience to his new post as rector. Since 1945 he has taught European history and French as a member of St. Andrew's faculty. He is also director of the Benedictine Oblates and moderator of the Newman Club of the Eastman School of Music.

He attended Immaculate Conception School, Rochester, Aquinas Institute, St. Andrews and St. Bernard's Seminaries. Following ordination on May 18, 1940, he served parishes in the Paterson, N. J. diocese and then Holy Cross parish, Rochester. He was named to the seminary faculty in 1945.

He has done graduate work in Columbia University and Canisius College where he won his master's degree. He is currently working towards his doctorate at Ottawa University.

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Msgr. Connell Named St. Margaret Mary Pastor; Fr. Quinn, Seminary Rector

After a quarter century of training young men to be parish priests, the Rev. Msgr. Maynard A. Connell, Ph.D., will himself take up pastoral duties as head of St. Margaret Mary Church, Irondequoit, on July 1. He was appointed by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney to succeed the late Rev. Charles J. Brien who died April 5.

The Very Rev. Richard M. Quinn has been named as new rector of St. Andrew's Seminary last Friday afternoon.

The announcement of the appointments was made by Bishop Kearney at commencement exercises of St. Andrew's Seminary last Friday afternoon.

MONSIGNOR CONNELL has been rector at St. Andrew's since 1930 and previously served as professor at St. Bernard's Seminary since 1932.

Besides his classroom lectures and administering the diocesan preparatory seminary, Monsignor Connell has distinguished himself as a noted speaker in area parish pulpits and in nationwide broadcasts.

While a student for his doctorate degree at Cornell University in 1929, he pioneered in religious broadcasts from Ithaca and Elmira stations. Later he was heard frequently on the Catholic Hour formerly broadcast every Sunday over station WIAH, and was four times a speaker on the CBS Church of the Air program.

He is a graduate of Blessed Sacrament parochial school, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries, and was ordained June 11, 1927.

Cardinal III, Not Arrested, Says Prelate

Vienna — (RNS) — Josef Cardinal Mindszenty is presently staying at the north Hungarian town of Sopron. He reported on the cardinal's whereabouts about a five-day period.

Cardinal Mindszenty was arrested after Archbishop Josef Groz, acting head of the Hungarian Bishops, told a group of correspondents at his residence in Kalocsa that reports of Cardinal Mindszenty's re-arrest were untrue.

THE ARCHBISHOP did not say specifically where the Hungarian Primate was at this time. He declared that the cardinal had been staying in an "ecclesiastical building" under favorable conditions since his release from prison last July.

The Budapest Radio quoted the archbishop as saying, "Cardinal Mindszenty is in freedom and I can contact him any time I want."

Church sources here noted that the station identified Cardinal Mindszenty for the first time as "His Eminence, the Archbishop of Esztergom."

Archbishop Groz himself was released from prison last October after serving more than four years of a 15-year term for alleged treason. Last month he was permitted by the Communist government to resume his functions as head of the Kalocsa See and acting chairman of the Bench of Bishops.

The Kalocsa prelate told the correspondents he could not report on the state of Cardinal Mindszenty's health because he had not seen the cardinal for a long time.

CARDINAL MINDSZENTY reportedly had been living under severe restrictions at Puspospek St. Ladis near the town of Fecs in south Hungary since he was released from prison. Reports that he had been re-arrested circulated after it was learned that he was no longer at Puspospek St. Ladis.

The Catholic sources here said, however, his absence from that community was no indication of his re-arrest. The Viennese sources stressed that they had never had "any confirmation of the German Catholic news agency report on Cardinal Mindszenty's re-arrest."

Meanwhile, the Hungarian Catholic paper Magyar Kurier reported that Archbishop Groz was enthusiastically welcomed when he returned to Kalocsa.

The paper said he issued a pastoral letter that "I, God for his return and pledging to be a faithful servant of the Holy Father and the Hungarian people."

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Holy Father Says Obscene Books Like Narcotics

Vatican City — Pope Pius XII called for a halt to all indecent literature, comparing its effects to "dangerous drugs which produce permanent disorders and stimulate artificial cravings."

The Pontiff spoke at an audience of delegates attending a World Congress of Editors. THE DANGEROUS effects of obscene literature, he said, are not restricted to children but also menace adults.

Pope Pius added that the severe penalties imposed by law against such literature are as justified as those which restrict the traffic of narcotics.

"An unscrupulous bookseller of obscene literature exploits the crudest desires of the masses, the Pope said, but "a man of honor will courageously guard against doing so."

"Respect for the demands of readers on the one hand, and respect for truth and morals on the other," the Pontiff continued, "makes it an imperative

Rochester Votes Fight Against Obscenity

Rochester City Council this week voted unanimously to seek State Supreme Court injunctions against publishers of obscene literature.

The resolution to ban obscene books and magazines from city sale was proposed by Councilman John G. Miller, Biller, president of the State Grand Commandery of the Knights of St. John, told council members that the knights organization at its recent Syracuse meeting had awarded that city a citation for cleaning up its newsstands.

Vice Mayor Joseph Farbo supported Miller's resolution and Mayor Peter Barry stated that in Rochester, "There is more objectionable literature on the stands today than anywhere else."

The Rochester Council directed city officials to investigate and enforce state anti-obscenity laws.

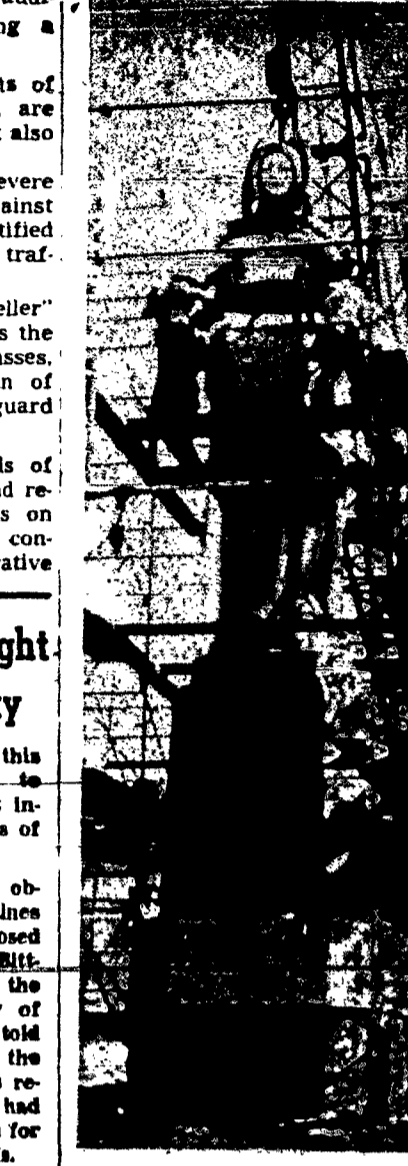
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Books and magazines written for children should be based on Biblical and historical stories rather than on "ridiculous fantasies," Pope Pius said.

The Pope admitted that there is general disregard of the Church's norms for decent literature but stated that "the national law itself should prevent editors from publishing the scenes of vice that appear in certain works."

Just because such books are intended for adult readers, he does not mean that "all is permissible," the Pope warned.

Challenges to laws of Michigan, New York and California have been filed with the courts. He said they adjourned for the summer without acting on them.

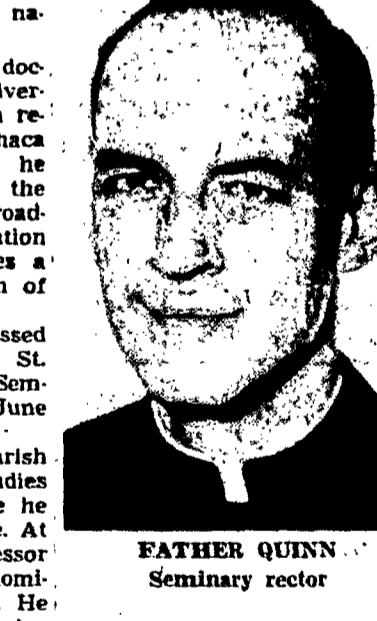
The court's decision is expected to be issued in the summer of 1957.



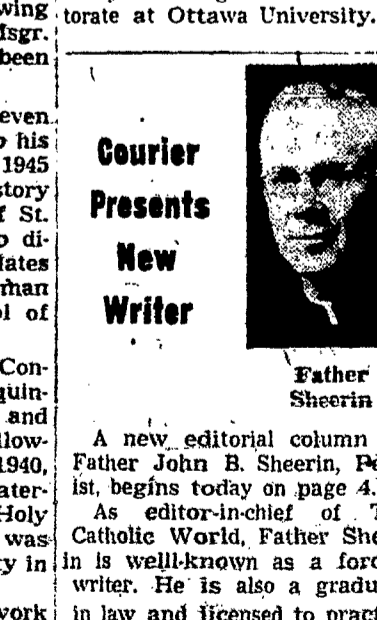
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MONSIGNOR CONNELL, Irondequoit pastor
