

Nazareth College Faculty Attends Summer Sessions

Three members of Nazareth College faculty will take part in graduate summer sessions beginning this month at Columbia University, University of Wisconsin and University of Ottawa, while another faculty member will represent Nazareth at a conference of historians, sponsored by University of Kansas.

William R. Gwinn, Ph.D., associate professor of history and chairman of the history department, left June 16 for the University of Kansas where he is attending a two-week invitational conference of leading historians on the subject: "The Progressive Period in Brief Perspective."

AT THE conclusion of the session on June 23, Dr. Gwinn will return to Nazareth to instruct in its summer session program beginning July 2.

Miss Mary T. Bush, M.A., instructor in history, will attend a six-week program at the University of Ottawa, Canada, to do graduate research in history. She has been a member of the Nazareth faculty for the last two years and received her master's degree in history from Georgetown University, Washington, D.C.

Alan A. Stamburski, Jr., M.A., instructor in speech and drama, will begin graduate research work toward the Doctor of Philosophy degree in speech and drama at the University of Wisconsin summer session which commences June 25. He received his master's degree in speech from Nazareth last year from the S.J. and Rev. Francis J. McNaughton, S.J.

The following scholars have been added to the faculty: John E. Solowski, M.A., instructor in Art, will leave June 30 for Europe on a two-month tour of the continent as part of a summer session graduate course in the art department for the past two years.

THREE OTHER members of the faculty will spend the summer in travel and independent study in Europe. Miss Rosemary White, B.Litt. Oxon., professor of English, will travel in England, France, Germany, Belgium, and Austria. She sailed June 12 from New York and plans to return to this country late in August.

Sister Eva Marie, placement and vocational guidance director, is leading a Nazareth College student tour. The group sails today from Quebec on the Arrosa Sun. Accompanying her is Sister Christine Francis, instructor in the biology department who plans to visit her home in England while she is abroad. The group will visit France, Italy, Switzerland, and England.

Sister Stephen Mary, who is now studying in Fribourg, Switzerland, will join the group in France and England before she returns to Fribourg to complete the work on her doctorate.

Sister Irene, who is in charge of the college cafeteria, will study this summer at Marywood College, Scranton, Pa.

Chairman of the science departments, Sister Marie Augustine, Ph.D., chemistry department, and Sister Francis Solomeo, Ph.D., biology department, will spend the summer in research projects.

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Father Rigney Forsees Early Release Of 11 Americans From Red-China Prison

Father Harold W. Rigney, S.V.D., a prisoner of Chinese Reds for four years, believes that the eleven Americans still held in communist jails will soon be released.

On a visit to St. Michael's Mission House on Hemlock Lake, the Divine Word missionary credited in part the release by China Reds of two American Jesuit Fathers this week to his newly launched Freedom Crusade.

A letter-writing campaign, which has taken hold across the nation, the Freedom Crusade is endeavoring by letter to petition the Chinese communist government for release of American prisoners still held in Chinese jails.

Among those making a Shanghai "tour," it was learned here, is the Rev. Joseph P. McCormack, a Maryknoll missionary, brother of Edward McCormack, 116 E. Main St., Palmyra.

Mr. McCormack received this week a letter, the first since October, from his brother-in-law, Thomas McCormack, according to the Rev. William Tobin, pastor of St. Patrick Church, Cato as well as the Red Creek church.

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The hell of mental and physical torture during his four years in a Red China prison was recalled by Father Harold Rigney, Society of Divine Word missionary, who this week visited the St. Michael's Mission House at Hemlock Lake. He is currently asking Americans to write letters to Red China leader Mao Tse-Tung in Peking, asking release of Americans still held in China jails.

Divine Word confers, Father as to begin instructions in the Rigney said "there are two things Catholic Faith and become a member of the Legion of Mary. do - eat and dress"

The later referred to the missionary's black silk cassock, cut in the native Chinese style with long air vents to the knee, which help the missionaries withstand the hot Chinese summers.

Father Rigney, who was head of the Pu Jen Catholic University in Peking, China, before its suppression by the Reds, said that many communists infiltrated into the university and nearly always were model students.

HE SAID THAT the Red students were usually the most industrious, most brilliant and most docile in the class, but in various and insidious ways planted the seeds of communism in the minds of weaker classmates.

One Chinese girl went so far as to say she would marry a Communist if she could.

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St. Joseph's Sisters' Hospital In Elmira Plans 6-Story Expansion

Construction of a new six story addition to St. Joseph's Hospital was forecast today in an announcement made by John E. Sullivan, chairman of the hospital's board of directors.

The new unit is expected to cost between \$750,000 and \$1,000,000.

First step in the building program was the appointment of Judge Daniel J. Donahoe of Chemung County's children's court as general chairman of a fund campaign tentatively set for November 1 to 18.

JUDGE DONAHOE is currently organizing a group of 2500 campaign workers for the November fund drive.

Directing the campaign is James A. Kipp of Ketchum, Inc., professional fund raiser for hospital campaigns. Headquarters of the Ketchum company are in Pittsburgh and New York City.

FINAL DETAILS of the proposed building are being drawn by Haskell, Conditine, and Haskell Elmira architects.

The proposed new unit will provide new dietary facilities, X-ray, obstetric and maternity care, medical records library, administrative offices, and 3 floors for general patient care.

THE PRESENT obstetric area will be used for geriatric nursing (care of the aged), for which there is an acute need in Elmira, it was stated.

Existing units of St. Joseph's Hospital include a six story medical building, five story surgical department, and a separate two story building for maternity.

The Elmira hospital on East Market Street is under the direction of the Sisters of St. Joseph and has a current capacity of 230 patients.

A Ford Foundation grant of \$113,400 will be used toward the total construction cost of the new unit.

Goal of the fall campaign will be announced as soon as architects complete their plans for the new building.
