Clergy Assigned; Mission Director, Pastors Appointed

Appointments of 46 priests of the Rochester Diocese to new posts were announced today by His Excellency Bishop Kearney. Included in the announcement are the assignment of 6 priests to special posts and the appointment of 4 priests to pastorates; the transfer of 20 assistant pastors; and the appointment to assistant pastorates of 15 newly ordained priests.

The Sisters are moving from their second temporary convent at 1550 East Ave. sometime this week in order to be at the new monastery near Locust Hill Country Club on Sunday.

With their campaign for a "finishing fund" a success the Sisters can now look forward to completing the monastery and establishing it as a permanent foundation.

They first came to Rochester in 1931 making the residence at 151 Saratoga Ave., now St. Patrick Rectory, their first monastery. From there they moved to 1550 East Ave., now in the hands of a new owner.

Converts From Judaism To Recall Edith Stein

New York.—(AP)—A Mass marking the 14th anniversary of the death of Edith Stein, German philosopher and convert to the Catholic Church from Judaism who was killed by the Nazis in the gas chambers of Auschwitz in 1945, will

be held at St. John's-Capuchin Church here on August 11. Following her conversion Edith Stein became a Carmelite nun and was known as Sister

Teresa Benedicta of the Cross when slain by the Nazis. THIS IS the second annual Mass for the martyred convert held under the auspices of the Edith Stein Guild, an organization formed to assist, guide and encourage Jewish converts.

Dr. Karl Stern, psychiatrist and author of "Pillar of Fire," will be the principal speaker at the Mass. Dr. Stern is a convert from Judaism. Sister Naomi of the Sisters of Notre Dame de Sion in Kansas City will receive the first "Edith Stein Award" at the breakfast for her devoted and self-sacrificing work among Jewish converts during the 39 years.
