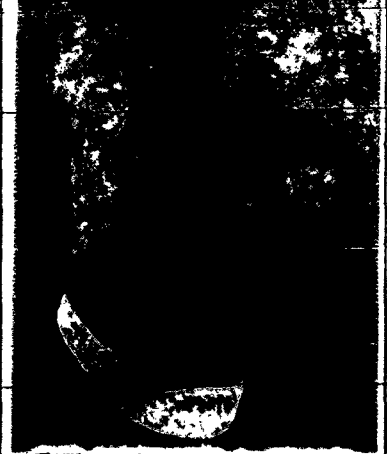
Father Kelly To Address Luncheon Club

Father LeFrois Leaves For Missionary Post

The Rev. Bernard J. LeFrois, formerly of St. Boniface Parish and a Society of the Divine Word missionary will leave for a new assignment, his "first full-fledged missionary post," about July 15. He is visiting at the home of one of his sisters, Mrs. Harold W. Senthoff, 974 Elm Grove Road.

Father LeFrois will sail from Seattle in the middle of August to join the faculty of Immaculate Conception Seminary, Viganon, Ilocos Sur, Philippines for the education of native clergy. He was named for the post by the Very Rev. Alois Kappenberg, S.V.D., his superior general in Rome.

Ordained in 1934 Father LeFrois was professor of Sacred Scripture at St. Mary Seminary, Techy, Ill. for the past 16 years.

In 1954 he went to Rome for publication of his thesis for the doctorate in Sacred Scripture entitled "The Woman Clothed With the Sun." Publication of the thesis which Father LeFrois presented and defended at the institute in November, 1953, was speeded up in view of his illness for the Marian Year.

Theme of his thesis was taken from the first verse of the 12th chapter of the Apocalypse: "And a great sign appeared in heaven: a woman clothed with the sun, and the moon was under her feet, and upon her head a crown of twelve stars."

The noted Marian scholar has three sisters in Religion. They are: Sister Alphonsa Marie S.S.J., superior of St. Ambrose Convent, Rochester; Sister Rose Cecelia of the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse, a music teacher and Sister Jane S.S.S., a missionary in the Gold Coast, British West Africa.

His other sister, Mrs. Scott is a member of Holy Ghost Parish, Colchester.

After the award presentation, Father LeFrois received the Mariological Award for 1955 from the Mariological Society in New York City on Jan. 5, 1956. He was awarded the \$100 prize for his "outstanding contribution" to Mariology at the close of the society's seventh annual convention.

The scripture scholar was elected the society's president for a two year term.
