

Released Jesuits Expected In Hong Kong June 30

Hong Kong — (RNS) — Two American Jesuits who were released from a Communist prison in Shanghai on June 15 will arrive here on June 30, the Catholic Center announced.

The missionaries are the Rev. John W. Clifford, S.J., of San Francisco, and the Rev. Thomas L. Phillips of Butte, Mont. They had each served a three-year term at Shanghai's Ward Road jail as alleged spies and counter-revolutionaries.

The center said the priests had been resting at a mission center in Shanghai conducted by Belgian priests and would come here on the S.S. Hamburg, a German boat.

Another announcement by the center said a Chinese priest, the Rev. Peter Tang of the Kaying diocese in Kwantung province, had been released from prison on May 29. It said Father Tang, who was arrested five months ago, is now back at his mission "completely free."

In the records of the Church from very early times, the poor were called the "altars of the Church." Hence when a stipend was offered for the Mass, it was to be enough not only for the sustenance of the priest, but also for the poor for whom the priest was bound to care. This may explain the language that St. Paul used to describe the alms which he collected for Jerusalem, and which were to be distributed during the Eucharistic Agape or the Mass. — "Because the administration of this office doth not only supply the wants of the saints, but aboundeth also for many Eucharists to the Lord." In other words, sacrifices to the poor became Divine worship.

Since we who are attached to the Holy Father's Pontifical Society for the Propagation of the Faith want to see the giver spiritualized as well as the recipient who receives, may we suggest that you send a letter to us asking for one Mass; but surround your request for a Mass with a sacrifice for the poor, which will prove that you love them in union with Christ and the Sacrifice of the Cross.

Bring your love of the lepers in Oceania, the hungry in India, the refugees—in Hong Kong to the great act of Love in the Mass and many blessings will come to you. For example, send a dollar for a Mass and \$10 or a \$100 for the poor in the Mission, and you will prove that you have sacrificed when you offer the sacrifice of the Mass. You will then be a kind of priest because you offer something; you will be a kind of Victim because it represents a sacrifice. Making you like Christ who is both priest and victim makes you one with Love and Peace and Joy. Thanks for increasing the sum total of love in the world through a stipend for one Mass surrounded by a charity for the poor of the world.

GOD LOVE YOU TO J.J.S. for \$5. "A small offering from my gold associates through me. Their game was off today." ... to Mr. and Mrs. L.R. "Enclosed please find \$10 for your missions and little children. We don't own a car, don't go to shows—Prefer to save for Our Lord's Missions." ... to M.D. for \$9. "My sister and I are trying to lose weight. Here is 20 cents a pound for what we lost." ... to Mrs. A.H. "Here is \$1.85, a percentage of all I earn, which I promised the Holy Father's Missions." ... to F.K. "Each of the players on our baseball team promised to give an offering for the Missions if we won the game. Total of \$100,700 Reported In Drive For Owego Church, Hall Improvements

Owego — St. Patrick's parish financial need appeal officially closed Wednesday night with a victory rally held in the church hall, at which time the final returns were made known to more than 90 team workers.

Rev. William J. O'Brien, pastor of St. Patrick's announced the total of \$100,700.00 in cash and pledges had already been turned in with several cards still outstanding. He termed the drive a success beyond all expectations.

The two hour solicitation of all parishioners was undertaken after several weeks of intensive preparation by more than 100 volunteer workers, who canvassed the parish last Sunday, June 17.

FATHER O'BRIEN praised the parishioners and the men who took part in the campaign for their loyalty and devotion to the parish. "It is indeed a heartwarming experience for me to see the unstinting loyalty and generosity displayed by so many parishioners."

Extensive renovations and repairs will be undertaken soon on the present church and hall under the present church and hall committee. The plans call for the complete redecoration of the interior of the church including new altars, a new sacristy, baptistry font, and two new confessionals.

A COMPLETE new heating system will be installed to replace the present outdated unit now in use. The present church hall will be modernized, with the removal of the stage and boiler room. This will make St. Patrick's hall one of the largest in the community. The present floor will be replaced by a new

New 3 Story School Wing Halfway Finished

Geneva—The new three-story wing to St. Stephen Parish Grammar School now about 50 percent completed is expected to be ready for full-session classes in fifth through eighth grade, in the Fall. The present school will house the first four grades.

Progress is "right up to schedule," according to the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, pastor of St. Stephen Church. "We have been assured it will be ready for a Sept. 1 opening."

Facing Elmwood Ave. the new wing is being constructed of cinder block with limestone stone facing and a limestone entrance. Corridor of the addition adjoins that of the present school plant.

PRINCIPAL FEATURES of the new wing will be eight classrooms, a kindergarten, teachers' room, principal's office and nurse's room on the upper floors, and a large meeting room. Boy Scout and Girl Scout activity rooms, janitors room, large store room, kitchen and dining room area in which non-resident children will be accommodated. A folding door will separate the two scout areas.

According to Father Nolan, most of the furniture is under order. Total cost of the project along with furnishings is expected to run about \$275,000.

Some 540 students attended classes in the present school building this past year, the priest explained.

The new wing is expected to accommodate about 320 more pupils on the basis of 35 to 40 pupils per class.

FOR THE PAST FOUR years, according to Father Nolan, the school has operated half day sessions for kindergartners as well as first and second grades. Double sessions were operated for third- and fourth-grades because of the heavy pupil load. And due to large enrollment, kindergarten sessions were dropped altogether this past school year.

The new wing is expected to correct this situation, however, with full day sessions scheduled to start in the fall in all grades. Kindergarten classes will be resumed on a half day basis with morning and afternoon classes.

Approximately 98 kindergartners are registered to date for fall classes. Previously the enrollment was 100.
